Withdraws From School Board Slate

To the Editor:

It is with regret that I must announce my withdrawal as a candidate in the election for the Farmington Board of Education. I have accepted a position as a civilian employee of the Defense Department and will be assigned to Munich, Germany for the coming year.

As a candidate I had intended to advocate much greater use of all existing school facilities by all of the public. I have been especially concerned about the fact that our fine public school libraries are closed at the end of the school day. At least the Junior and Senior High School libraries should be open several evenings a week. They should be staffed during these evening hours by paid competent, professional librarians, just as they are in the day time.

SUCH A SCHEDULE would help relieve the overload on the facilities of the Farmington Public Library and at the same time would allow the students of Farmington much greater use of tax-supported libraries which now sit idle during the evening hours when they are most needed.

Most of the money allotted under the Federal Aid to Education Act recently passed by Congress will be used to enlarge public school libraries.

Your tax money is wasted if these books are not made available for much greater use. I urge the people of Farmington to cooperate with the School Administration and the Board of Education in implementing such an expanded library use program immediately.

I greatly appreciate the encouragement and assistance of the many people who support my candidacy. It has been interesting to work with the Board of Education in the past and I hope to be of greater service in the future.
