

Re-zoning, Plot Plans Receive Twp. Bd. Okay

In quick order and with very little discussion at its regular meeting Monday night, the Farmington Township Board approved unanimously re-zoning from single family residential to multiple family district two good sized parcels of land. Plot plans for Old Franklin Town Subdivision 2 and 3 south of 14 Mile Road in the Middlebelt Road area, with one minor change to include an area for a savings and loan building, were also approved.

Federal Funds Approved For School Dist.

The Farmington Public School District has received approval for \$3,420 in federal funds for participation in Project Head Start, a summer program for pre-kindergarten children. The program, designed to provide enriching experiences for young children in the district who might benefit from it, will include story hours, informal song sessions, field trips, drawing and art, and physical examination.

(Continued from Page 1A) how he should divide his time between the two communities. Hall commented that trying to service the entire 36 square mile area with one dog warden would be "like picking up the title with a pitchfork." He estimated that to get even limited service it would cost \$18,000 to \$20,000 yearly and that the problem was not serious enough to warrant this kind of an expenditure, in his opinion.

ONE OF the re-zoning requests was for the Hunters Ridge multiple housing development planned west of Orchard Lake Road and south of 14 Mile. The original request was for re-zoning of approximately 100 acres for a 1,000 lot development but the Township Board's final decision was in favor of allowing only approximately 57 acres to be re-zoned for multiple housing development at this time.

The second request was for re-zoning of the old Children's Hospital property on Tulek Road, summer of 1964, to permit a private convalescent home to be developed there. It was indicated that the site is approximately 30 acres in size.

TRUSTEE Byron Walter asked what would prevent the utilization of some of the vacant property at this location from being developed with public multiple housing units. He was informed that the property could not be distributed to the school district if it was re-zoned but that there was reasonable certainty that the whole parcel would be needed for the \$500 to \$550 per acre development he proposed to be developed there.

Supervisor Harrison said that the program can be operated in Farmington at very little cost to the school district. It would be self-supporting with the exception of the use of school facilities, janitorial services and transportation, he added.

Sand Removal To Continue

A request for an extension of time on sand removal operations presently in progress on 13 Mile Road near Halstead Road was approved by the Township Board at its regular meeting Monday night, May 24.

The board approved extension of the permit until September 1 but with the understanding that only the Wolverine Contractors be allowed to remove sand from this property which is owned by Canvasser Brothers Construction Co.

Township officials were high in their praise of the way the Wolverine Co. had complied with requirements in keeping road dust down and following the regulations at set forth.

They pointed out that any troubles that were experienced were the result of another contractor doing a shoddy job from that location and that this was the reason for restricting the extension of the permit to Wolverine Contractors only.

No excavation work is being done, it was emphasized, but only cutting down and leveling the area to allow development of a subdivision there.

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Overtime Pay Approved For Sch. Personnel

The Farmington Board of Education, at a regular meeting on May 24, approved the start of overtime pay on January 1, 1966, for the operations and maintenance personnel of the district.

The overtime pay, time-and-a-half for over 40 hours in one week or over eight hours in one day, was to have started in the fall of 1966; but after a meeting of the board's salary committee and union representatives, the recommendation for advancement of the starting date was made.

Supt. Gerald V. Harrison made it clear that it is the intention of the administration that there be no overtime except on an emergency basis. He said that every effort would be made to schedule work within the 40 hours and eight hours.

Consumers "Buckles Up"

J. P. Thomas, Division Manager, Consumers Power Company, West Wayne Division, announced the 10 per cent completion of seat belt installations in all company vehicles in this area. This installation included the largest as well as the smallest vehicles used by this company.

To stimulate the "Buckle-Up" habit, Dr. Paul W. Gikas, Assistant Professor of Pathology at the University of Michigan Medical School, spoke to employees Tuesday morning at the Kick-Off Seat Belt Meeting held in the Livonia Service Center. Dr. Gikas, using color slides, reviewed serious traffic accidents and pointed out how seat belts could have saved lives.

To Have Fence At Highmeadow Sch.

A four-foot, chain link fence around part of the Highmeadow School site was approved by the Board of Education at their regular meeting on May 24.

The District will advertise for bids for the approximately 800 feet of fencing needed.

Recommended for each school were 20 music stands, one bass drum and accessories, one snare drum and accessories, one pair of cymbals and accessories, one baritone horn, one French horn, one tuba, and one euphonium.
