FHS Captures League Crowns In Tennis and Cross-Country

The athletic teams at Farmington High School captured two conference crowns during the 1964-65 school year. The cross country crews at Farmington High had been 13 years without a title, but coach Fordy Kennedy made no mistake in taking the crown this year as Joe Watson, Bruce Anderson, and Ron McGaw finished first, second and third in the Conference race.

Coach Gerald Potter's tennis squad clinched a share of the Conference title by beating Walled Lake 5-0. A 5-1 conference win by the Falcon netmen with Pontiac North. The doubles teams of Kurt Dembeck and Terry Bacon, and Jim Arnold and Dennis Moore remained undefeated throughout the dual meet competition.

Before the Conference meet, the Falcon Harriers ended up fifth in a ten-team race in the Oakland County meet as Bruce Anderson led the team with an eleven place finish.

JOE WATSON, John Karwowski and Bruce Anderson qualified for the State Finals, but the team as a whole fell one place to qualifying.

In the State Finals, Joe Watson was the highest finisher for Farmington, placing sixth going career climaxed by winning medalist honors in the State Class A meet his senior year.

After the upset victory over Northern, the Falcons lost three straight games, but a four touchdown scoring effort by Roy Leach brought a 32-19 win over Roseville and ended the short losing streak.

The football squad again shutout its opponents in the next game, as Bruce Charles led the attack in a 17-0 victory over his father's Southern Jays. The Varsity chargers ended a successful season on an even note when North Farmington was Farmington dueled to a 0-0 tie in the Annual Old Yale Log Football Game. Youth Farmington's "Chain Gang" and Farmington's "Demolition Crew" dominated the game.

Winners for the "Bingo, Bango, Bungo" were Peg Wright, Laurel Bookbinder, Wilma Northway and Alice Parber.

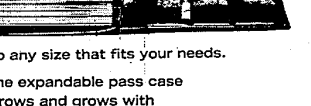
