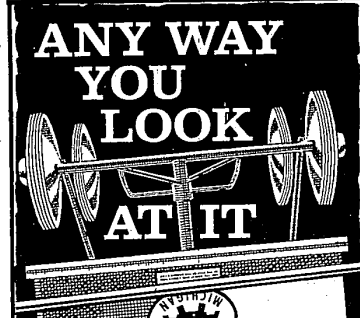
Elmer J. Gaunt Is New Dealer For Standard
