MOTION by Bassette, supported by Cairns, that the Township Board does hereby approve the plans and cost estimate of \$387,875.00 for sanitary sewers in parts of Sections 35 and 36 and Richland Gardens as prepared by Pate, Hitt and Bogue, and this Board does hereby determine to proceed with the said improvements, and that the Supervisor is hereby directed to make a special assessment roll assessing the cost of said improvements against the lands in said Special Assessment District and report the same to this Board. Roll Call Vote: 4 Yeas, 0 Nays. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Duke, supported by Bassette, that the D'Agostini Construction, Inc. be awarded the contract in the amount of \$21,689.31 in Sunnydale, contingent upon the Clarenceville School District depositing with the Township construction funds, inspection fees for engineering and administration costs to the Township. Carried - unanimous.
