Nearly 100 at 2nd Annual Democratic Club Dinner

The school aid bill passed by the Democratic legislative majority provides for substantial assistance to low tax base school districts like Farmington. Democratic State Chairman Zoltan A. Ferency told these in attendance at the second annual dinner of the Farmington Democratic Club.

Ferency pointed out to the audience of nearly 100 that a feature of the bill is the tremendous shot in the arm it gives to school districts where the tax valuation behind each pupil is below the statewide average of \$13,500. The figure for the Farmington school district is below \$10,000.

Ferency devoted most of his speech to praising the record of the Legislature so far for having made considerable progress in many areas beside the school aid bill.

Increased aid to higher education; increased state aid for community mental health centers; tax relief for senior citizens in the area of real estate taxes; good workmen's pension plan; uniform milk and meat inspection legislation, and a considerable improvement of the voter registration laws were all cited by him.

Ferency noted that in other areas "we're not making the progress we should be making until we're ready as taxpayers and citizens to face up to our responsibility." He said this means finding new revenue.

Ferency was introduced by Democratic Club Chairman Aldo Vagnozzi, who recalled that both had started out in politics as Young Democrats in Wayne County. Dinner chairman was Harold Shipce. He was assisted by Harry Zuchlinski and Mrs. Marianne MacCrimmon.

Oakland County Democratic Chairman George Gogossian praised the work of the Farmington Democratic Club.

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
