

MD Campaign Surges '64 Goal

Final tabulations reveal that the Muscular Dystrophy fund-raising drive, "Dystrophy's March Against Time," conducted early this month in Farmington surpassed the goal reached in 1964 during the local campaign by nearly 25 percent.

Mrs. Thomas R. Nolan, Chairman of the Farmington Township MD Campaign, announced a total of \$1,271.35 had been collected in the 1966 solicitation and door-to-door canvases. Funds received for the campaign came from canvassers placed in local businesses and from donations received by mail are not included in the total figure. The door-to-door canvass in 1964 netted \$880.

MRS. NOLAN PRAISED the work of volunteer canvassers for much of the success this year's MD campaign achieved. Some of the ladies who did campaign contact work on the telephone were Cora Zuchow-ske, Denise O'Neill, Della Schwan, Sharon Fleeman, Di-anne Johnson, Carol Franks, Mary Ellen Kelly and Mary Ayotte.

The DeMolay Chapter of Farmington, sponsored by the Farmington Masonic Lodge, No. 151 F. and A. M., had members Bill Kolst, John Dunsmore, Paul LaVole, Henry Iverson, Edward Bond, Hank Goad, Chuck Valerius, Jerry Kankrich, Larry Caputo and Steve Kreuter participating in the MD fund-raising campaign as one of the volunteer work done nationally by DeMolay chapters.

Other groups who participated in this year's local MD campaign were Farmington Girl Scout Cadette Troop 123, the St. Alexander's Church Youth Fellowship group and the Forest Park teens.

Take Action to Go Ahead on Parking Lot

The City Council took action at its regular meeting Monday night approving a formal resolution to proceed with the special assessment off-street parking lot improvement project.

The lot is located on the north side of Grand River Avenue east of Farmington Road.

At a public hearing on this improvement held two weeks earlier action on adopting the resolution was delayed to permit further study due to vigorous objection to the method of assessment registered by Curt Hall, owner of the Pioneer Oldsmobile building and township supervisor.

Hall's contention was that the assessment should not have been levied on a front lot basis and that he had no need for the parking lot improvement since he provided sufficient off-street parking space on his own private property.

Hall's only comment upon learning of the Council's Monday night action was that "it will have to be evaluated and appropriate action taken depending on what the city's final decision on its assessment was."

Puts Up Cable To Block Road He Says is His

An old nemesis of Farmington Township officials broke back into the news this week when Township Police were called on Tuesday afternoon, June 22, to investigate a road-block across Drake Road at Fend Road.

The roadblock was in the form of a steel cable stretched across the narrow right-of-way on Drake Road at Fend Road in the southwest corner of the Township.

WILLIAM C. SPESS, who owns ten acres of property on Drake Road between Rhonswood and Fend roads, set up the roadblock. He claims the right-of-way in front of his property is a private road but ruling made by Oakland County Circuit Judge William J. Beer on April 30, 1964, gave an "injunctive judgment" against him.

The section of roadway being blocked by Spess has been a dedicated Oakland County road for several years but Spess maintains he built a road before the road before the County took it over and he should either be reimbursed for his expenses by the County or the road should be made a private road. Spess, over the years, has repeatedly sought to close the roadway and admitted Tuesday it was the fifth cable he had used to block the road. The Oakland County Road Commission, acting on the complaint filed by Farmington Township Police, indicated Tuesday they intended to remove the cable and re-open the roadway in front of Spess' property. Spess' action to close the roadway plus courts end up with his receiving a jail sentence on contempt of court charges.

YMCA Robbed Of Over \$900

The Farmington YMCA Headquarters building at 35100 Grand River Avenue in Farmington Township was broken into sometime over the June 19 weekend and over \$900 stolen in cash and checks. The culprit, who gained entry to the building by breaking a window in the door, also took a 15 1/2-inch portable television set and \$25 worth of stamps.

Police Chiefs Urge Safety

Both local chiefs of police joined in urging parents to keep youngsters off the highways with bicycles over the long Fourth of July weekend in the interests of making the period a safer one for travel.

Township Police Chief Irving H. Valdes and Maurice D. Foltz, Director of the Department of Public Safety for the Farmington Township, both said extra patrols would be sent out for the Fourth to help in the direction of heavy volumes of traffic which are expected on area roads.

Seek Action on Sewer Problem

The sanitary sewage disposal problem that the City of Farmington has been beset with for many months is near the Carl Shaw property on Valleyview Street was back up for more discussion at the regular Tuesday night meeting Monday night, June 21.

Councilman Ralph Yoder stated that he and Mayor Sandy Brotherton and Councilman John Allen had inspected the situation over the weekend and were in accord that something had to be done to close up the large whole where raw sewage can be seen running.

total expenditure for the police department called for in last year's proposed budget of slightly over \$122,000.

Over \$75,000 in the proposed budget has been earmarked for capital improvements. This included an expenditure of \$37,200 for the purchase of new fire station sites and another expenditure of \$29,000 for the purchase of a fire truck.

The Township officials had drawn up an original budget in hopes of being allowed a tax levy of 1.4 mills per \$1,000 equalized valuation but the Township Board had to lower the tax to 1.2 mills to the township this year.

with the county for the light installation and to discuss the matter with his board in the near future.

Dinan stated that he would report back to the Council on the county's decision on this point as soon as it is reached and that signing of the proposed agreement should be delayed until that time.

Councilmen agreed with the city manager's suggestion.

During general discussion Councilman John Allen had some critical remarks to make regarding the way the county is presently maintaining Farmington Road between 8 and 9 Mile. He pointed out that weeds along this main thoroughfare are not being cut down and that he had noted a dead animal at the side of the roadway several days back that has still not been picked up.
