OLS Rams Show Improvements, But Lose 26-13

The Our Lady of Sorrows Rams, playing their first home game of the season with St. Lawrence's team last Sunday, were downed by a score of 26-13.

Early in the first quarter, Gerald DeGrace, playing half-back for St. Lawrence, returned a punt 50 yards for a touchdown. A pass play for the extra point was successful and at the end of the first quarter St. Lawrence led 7-0.

A late moment for Sorrows came early in the second quarter, when a punt return was fumbled and recovered by the Rams. Sorrows, then used its most tactical weapon of the day, the passing combination of Ron Thomas and Ray Unks, and reeled off 10 and 15 yard gains. A 25 yard pass play to Ray Unks, brought Sorrows their first touchdown of the game, and at half time the score was tied 7-7.

During the second half, St. Lawrence found the Rams' Achilles' heel and by a series of reverse plays around end, and superior rushing, managed to tally three additional touchdowns. Another St. Lawrence touchdown was averted by a dramatic end-zone interception by Bob Unks.

The Rams rallied in the fourth quarter and scored on a pass to Ray Unks from the yard line.

Although flaws in the Rams defensive line resulted in stopping spirited attacks, a definite improvement in passing and offensive running was noted.

Asked his opinion of his team's efforts, Coach Mrozinski replied, "Much improvement, and much improvement needed."

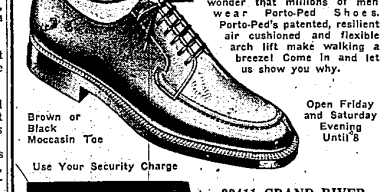
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
