Local Union Joins In Request For Price Study

The National Independent Union Council (N.I.U.C.), with which the Farmington Labor Improvement Association at Star Cutter Company is affiliated, called on President Eisenhower last week to investigate the rising cost of living.

Local Labor Association President, Bernard Stafford, was on the committee which recommended this action embodied in a resolution adopted at the group's seventh annual convention at the Fort Shelby Hotel.

Composed of unions not affiliated with the major labor federations, N.I.U.C. asked that Mr. Eisenhower establish a board of representatives from labor, management and the general public to investigate the cost of living and make recommendations for stabilizing our economy.

Other resolutions asked that the Department of Labor study the shortage of doctors, that postal employees be given wage increases and that higher tariffs be placed on imports.
