Richard Hoffman of 22135 Tuck Road has been named among a group of about 140 superior freshmen in the University of Michigan College of Literature, Science and the Arts who have courses specially designed for them this fall.

Professor Robert C. Angell of the sociology department, director of the new program, spent the summer screening records and interviewing prospective honor students from among the approximately 2,000 freshmen entering the U-M this fall.

The students selected were ranked in the top five per cent of their graduating classes. More than half had taken part in the Fellowship awards program.

The new program, result of three years planning by a committee on curriculum flexibility, was approved last spring. Special sections of freshman courses have been set up for the gifted students. Angell and other heads of departments of LSA will set up a program for all four years of undergraduate work of the superior students.

The world famous Don Cossack Chorus and Dancers, currently performing their 17th anniversary tour, will make their first Detroit appearance of this season on the Marygrove College stage at West McNichols and Wyoming, Friday, October 11.

Under the auspices of the Marygrove Dads Club, the Cossacks will present a matinee program at 3 p.m. and an evening performance at 8:30 p.m.

Piuloff Don Cossack Chorus was originally organized in the capital of Czechoslovakia, Prague, in 1927. Ever since its inception the Chorus has been headed by Nicholas Kostukoff who acted simultaneously as the chorus leader and its administrator.

The membership of the group has always comprised the best of the vocal talent obtainable among the White Russian emigres who fought Communism in Russia as early as 1918-1920 and who actually were in the fight against the World Communism. All members of the Chorus are now American citizens.

The Cossacks present a varied program ranging from stately, religious music to the stirring folk melodies, and including classical music highly singable by highly trained choruses. Their repertoire also includes exciting cossack dances and popular American melodies.

Dollars For Dems. Drive Oct. 11, 12

A state-wide drive to increase "grass - roots" participation in politics will take place on October 11-12.

The event is "Dollars for Democrats," an organized effort to broaden the base of Party support by enlisting as many small contributors as possible.

Heading the drive in Farmington area as a Regional Director is Tom Raye, 25504 Normandy, Roseville. Counties included in the drive are: Bay, Genesee, Livingston, Oakland, Saginaw and Shiawassee.

Republicans are engaged in a similar effort in some counties. "Political parties have no source of income except voluntary contributions from citizens who believe in the party's program and want to see it carried through," B. J. McGuigan, State finance director of the Democratic Party said.

"Dollars for Democrats is our way of openly soliciting the widest possible participation on the part of the average citizen," McGuigan said.

"The 1957 effort is the second such drive. In 1955, the number of individual contributors of small amounts to the Democratic Party rose from some 7,000 to about 10,000 under the plan."

McGuigan explained that Dollars for Democrats involves organized personal solicitations in each area. Door to door canvassing will be done where precinct organizations are developed sufficiently to carry it out.

Persons not so reached during the drive are asked to contribute directly to Dollars for Democrats, 317 Townsend, Lansing 33, Michigan.

Lawrence Tech Has Record Enrollment

An all-time record enrollment of 3,116 students is reported by the Lawrence Institute of Technology. President E. George Lawrence said the increase is better than 10 percent over last year - the previous best in L. I. T.'s 25 year history.

The college on Northwestern Highway and Ten Mile Road ranks as one of the largest engineering colleges in the United States with 3,112 students studying degree courses in architectural, civil, electrical, industrial and mechanical engineering. The remaining 94 students are studying degrees courses in industrial management and associate engineering courses with the technical institute division.

The Census Bureau reports that spending by all units of government set a record of \$114,500,000 in the 1956 fiscal year.

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
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What's Happening In Your Township

This week I am quoting further from the Master Plan Study prepared by Villan-Leman & Associates, Planning Consultants to the Township of Farmington as it pertains specifically to Commercial Land Use.

"The major conclusions reached indicate the following:

1. The range of income levels used are:
a. \$6,000 - middle
b. \$8,000 - middle-high
c. \$10,000 - high
2. Shopping centers are located to serve more than one neighborhood due to the changes in shopping habits brought about by the use of the automobile.
3. Existing commercial development where well established and of substantial nature should be integrated with the new commercial centers wherever possible.
4. Eleven centers are proposed with an average size of 28 gross acres. For each square foot of floor space three square feet of parking space are provided.
5. Shopping centers should be designed as an overall project with site and buildings integrated functionally. Proper relationship between the servicing of the shopping center, customer automobile traffic, and parking and ease of pedestrian flow must be achieved.
6. Proper zoning controls to achieve the desired commercial pattern for the whole of Farmington Township must be further studied and enacted."
