coming from such industry could be used by the township for all other facilities, and particularly schools. Secretary Wiess said \$6 of every \$7 in tax money now goes for schools. There are now 12 school projects in the township and as the population increases the need will be for more money.

SEVERAL in the audience said they'd be very happy to pay much higher taxes and keep out more industry, particularly a zoned area.

Chairman Ghesquiere questioned if this were true of the entire township. One man in the audience backed him up, saying long time residents have looked on increasing taxes with distaste, and wonderment if they could continue to pay them as they grew older.

SOME PURELY residential areas, with Franklin Village cited as one, may have difficulties with the future, because the industry to spread the tax base, some board members think. Mr. Ghesquiere said there is no doubt but that the township would benefit twice from industrial zones.

One homeowner objected that he had built in the area having no way of knowing it might become industrial. Harvey Freeman said this plan would be protection for future homeowners and, while it might hurt some now, it would be protection for large numbers in the future.

THE GRAND River industrial area is exactly what the board doesn't want the remainder of the township to grow into. There was no planning here, and now no room for expansion.

On a petition by John Becker to zone property at 2112 Waldron Avenue as commercial and use a standing building, there was some objection and he was asked to present a map which could be checked by the planning consultants.

School Enrollment Breakdown Given

A breakdown of school enrollment by grades in the Farmington public school system shows a pattern of progressively increased enrollment in the past several years, regardless of new home construction in the area.

Starting with grade 12 which had an official enrollment of 100 students this year, the enrollment for each of the lower grades increases steadily. Biggest enrollment is recorded in the kindergarten with 823 students have been enrolled to date.

The official school enrollment in the Farmington public schools this year is 6,100, representing an increase of 823 students over last year.
