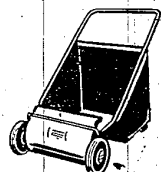

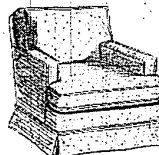

## Enrollment Up In Most Grades

A breakdown of school enrollment by grade in the Clarenceville School District shows increases over the 1956-57 school year in all but two grades. The figures are those compiled on the fourth Friday of September, used as the official school enrollment for purposes of State Aid. The only two grades showing decreases in enrollment were grades 3 and 7, with decreases of 39 and 28, respectively.

## Opposes Shifting More College Cost Back to Students

Attempts to shift more and more of the cost of higher education to the student ignore the fact that democracy is dependent upon education, University of Michigan President Harlan Hatcher believes. The idea, prevalent in some circles, that college training has economic value to the individual, who therefore should assume the cost of his education, overlooks the benefits which society as a whole receives from higher education, he asserts.

"Such an idea can be extended to support the view that a person shouldn't go to college unless he wants to increase his earning power," he points out. "As a result, the feeling that the student should pay more and more of the cost of higher education is tending to grow."

Current economic conditions coupled with an increase in some fees has tended to reduce anticipated enrollments precisely at a time when there is critical need for more trained scientists and teachers, Hatcher declares.

"The critics of higher education had better take another look and see what could happen to this nation if their idea of constantly increasing the student's share of the cost is extended beyond the present levels," he warns.

## Time to Plant Shade Trees Now Says Park Management Specialist

If the summer sun showed too much enthusiasm about heating down on your house, yard and head, now is the time to plant shade trees.

Broadleaf shade trees can be planted any time between mid-October and freeze up, according to Harold Schick, extension specialist in "park management" at Michigan State University. When most of the leaves are off a tree it is dormant and can be transplanted.

If you want the wind protection, beauty, shade, property value and the many other benefits of shade trees, the first step is finding a place for them. Sewer pipes, overhead wires, sidewalks and foundations should be planted no closer than 10 feet from the house. Sidewalks and drains should be at least five feet from any trees.

If you are forced to plant under wires or in a confined space,

Schick suggests small trees such as flowering crab, flowering cherry, dogwood or mountain ash. Small trees such as these need at least 30 feet between them.

At least 50 feet should be left between medium sized trees such as Norway maple, little leaf linden and English or scarlet oak.

If you have the space, larger trees such as sycamore, American elm or sugar maple can be planted with a minimum of 60 feet between trees.

For bare root planting, that is, without the ball of soil around the roots, Schick suggests the following procedure:

1. Dig the hole large enough to give all the roots room to spread out. Save the top soil separate from the subsoil. Only good top soil should be used to fill in the hole. You will probably need extra top soil to make up for the subsoil or for the filler if you have poor soil.
2. Keep the whole tree moist but don't place the roots under water. Plant as soon as possible after the tree is dug up. The longer it sits around the less are your chances for successful transplanting.
3. Before filling in the hole drive a stake in about a foot or less from the tree on the same side of the tree as the prevailing wind. It should reach at least as high as the lower limbs.
4. Place the tree at the same depth or a little deeper than it was originally. Fill in and tamp the soil and soak with water. Leave a saucer shaped depression around the tree to collect and hold moisture.
5. Wrap the tree with burlap or special water proof tree wrapping paper and wire the tree to the stake by running the wire around the stake and through a length of old garden hose so as not to scar the trunk.
6. About one third of the branches should be pruned after planting. The main branch should not be cut. Fertilizer is not necessary if good top soil is used. It may injure the roots by burning.

Some of the undesirable trees in Michigan are the silver maple (soft maple), cottonwood (poplar), box elder and Chinese elm. The silver maple and Chinese elm are brittle and break easily in the wind, Schick says. Cottonwood grows rapidly and tends to clog drains. The "cotton" from the seed also is a nuisance. Box elders are not only brittle but they are an attraction for box elder beetles.
