Falcons Edge Out Walled Lake For Second Conference Win

Farmington scored its second conference victory in as many starts by edging Walled Lake 12-6, in action last Friday night at Walled Lake.

Neither team scored in the first

quarter as the result of costly fumbles by both clubs. Early in the second quarter, Walled Lake scored first blood when Bill Yeargen moved the ball into scoring territory on a brilliant 45-yard run and lugged it over from there on the next play to paydirt. The conversion try, however, went wide.

A PENALTY cost Walled Lake another touchdown in the same period when Yeargen carried over for the score only to have the ball called back.

In the closing seconds of the first half, Farmington fullback Frank Stevenson knotted things up by carrying over for the Falcons. The conversion try failed and the two teams left the field at halftime with the score deadlocked at 6-6.

Again in the third quarter neither team was able to score. Early in the fourth quarter, Farmington pushed ahead when Dave Catherman, halfback and principal ground gainer for the Falcons, drove over after a sustained drive down field. The conversion try again failed.

Walled Lake narrowly missed its chance of tying or even winning the game in the closing minutes of play. Yeargen raced across the goal line and just missed a long pass which could have tied things up and given the Vikings a good chance of winning by making the conversion.

Designs Home With Sidewall Beams Showing

The newest thing in the house is a wall with its structure showing.

Paul Hayden Kirk, American Institute of Architects, nationally known Seattle designer of contemporary homes, has extended the pattern of roof beam exposure to the wall posts. This has been accomplished by bringing roof decking lumber, in two-by-six-inch dimension, with tongue and groove pattern, down to form the exterior walls.

This new look in home design takes form through installation of two-by-sixes in horizontal lengths on the interior side of the wall posts. Fitted by tongue and groove with a slight "V" joint, a tight wall surface is formed.

Architect Kirk points out that the solid sidewall of two-inch thickness contains in itself all essential values of structural strength, insulation, safety, and qualities of surface and texture that welcome a great variety of finishes and beauty treatments. Those wishing a more insulated wall could add semiskin or cedar interior paneling over the solid wall.

The rugged appeal of plank, beam and post design is projected from the whole structure to the outside view. The exposed wall posts are four to seven feet apart, united at the top with overhanging roof beams. The structure of the house is stabilized from ridge to foundation, Kirk emphasizes. He believes that the economy of the design, with its appeal of beauty and efficiency by the contemporary family, will serve to popularize this solid sidewall type of construction.

Seniors to Take Qualifying Tests

Tuesday, October 22, fifty-two seniors from Clarenceville High School will take the 1957 Scholarship Qualifying Test. The examination is conducted by the Educational Testing Service for the use of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and other Scholarship sponsors.

The test is open to any secondary school senior who has made arrangements to take the test. The student will declare his eligibility as a possible recipient of an award and then proceed to take the examination.

Life Of Automatic Washers Set At 10 Years

A leading automatic washing machine manufacturer estimates the life of his product at 10 years with eight cycles a week. That amounts to turning out 4,100 loads of clean laundry.

However B. F. Cargill, engineer at Michigan State University, figures most machines will do even better with this with proper operation, maintenance and possibly, some major overhauls.

When buying a clothes dryer, remember: that the reliability of the manufacturer and dealer are important; to check the guarantee and available service; to buy the one that best suits your needs; to put it in the most convenient place; and to use it effectively.

Too much, as well as too little, detergent will give poor results when washing laundry. Be sure to follow the manufacturers' directions as to amount; and measure the detergent each time.

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
