New Laws on Food in Effect

Michigan food shoppers are protected by many laws which are enforced by the Michigan Department of Agriculture. As recently as September 27, some new food laws went into effect to prevent false advertising of meat and meat products, reports MSU Marketing Information Agent, Mrs. Josephine Lawler.

It is now unlawful to describe any meat by the use of the words "prime," "choice" or "good" unless the meat advertised for sale actually bears the "USDA" federal stamp designating such grade, or is of equal quality as the federal grade would designate.

Grades tell you most about meat quality. The better grades will be more tender and have more flavor or while the lower grades will be less tender requiring different cooking methods to develop the best flavor.

Retailers must now state whether ham is skinned or regular. Hereafter any ham marked as "one-half" or "half-ham" must be a half ham with no center slices removed. Pork shoulder cannot be described as "ham."

In each part of the state men from the Bureau of Foods and Standards of the State Department of Agriculture are constantly checking to see that food in the stores meets its advertising claims. These men are silent helpers of all food shoppers.

There will be some changes made in meat advertising. The new laws have more helpful information for the consumer.
