Evergreens To Need Watering

Evergreens need a good soaking with water before the soil freezes.

That's the word from Fred Widmeyer, extension horticulturist at Michigan State University.

He points out that more evergreens die from the lack of water than from any other factor.

Most of the jumpers and arbutus that were lost this year could be attributed to a shortage of water last fall and winter, Widmeyer says. Last year we were about six inches short on moisture going into the winter. Currently, we are about four inches short on moisture.

Give evergreens a good soaking every few days until the soil freezes, Widmeyer recommends. This means running the garden hose for at least an hour around the roots of the tree. If we get plenty of rain, the supplemental watering may be cut down.

The horticulturist warns that without additional watering, more evergreens may be lost this fall and winter than were lost last year.

Nature's Mystery

Wood is prized for home construction because it has a built-in insulating system created by nature when the tree was growing. Each growth ring is made up of tiny cells of varying density and size with tiny air spaces which make wood the almost perfect insulator. Along the rain-drenched Pacific slope states, trees like Douglas fir and west coast hemlock, grow fast in spring, slow in summer, making perfect insulating cellular material, one reason why these two wood species are most popular for home construction.

Many aspects of the life cycle of shrimps have been discovered by a process called "tagging." Small numbered disks are placed on the young, which are then released to wander as they will. By paying fishermen 50 cents for each "tagged" shrimp when it is found, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service can discover the relationship between its final destination and where it was first set loose to roam.
