## Legion Membership Drive Is Going Well; Supper Planned

Who is eligible to belong to "The American Legion?" That's a question being asked this week, as the local American Legion Post launches its 1952 membership campaign.

Senior Vice Commander Donald Watson, membership chairman of the drive, points out that veterans of World War I, World War II, and the Korean War who were in service on active duty during certain dates of hostilities, as set by the United States Congress, are eligible for membership in The American Legion.

The eligibility dates areas follow: World War I veterans, from July 6, 1917, to Nov. 11, 1918; World War Veterans, from December 7, 1941, to September 2, 1945.

Korean veterans, from June 25, 1950, to July 27, 1953.

Eligible veterans are men and women who served honorably in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, or Air Force of the United States during the above dates, or citizens of the United States at the time of war who served on active duty with any of the armed forces of governments associated with the United States.

All such services should be terminated with an honorable discharge or honorable separation or continued honorably after either of above mentioned periods.

## Tell Need of Public Forums

Boards of education should sponsor public forums to help determine community problems. That advice was given to the Michigan School Boards Conference at Michigan State University by a noted educator.

"Through such public forums school boards can provide the opportunity for people to study and learn what problems face their town," declared Dr. Walter Beggs, University of Nebraska.

"This inability of people to clear identity community needs was cited by the speaker as one of the three major stumbling blocks to community progress.

"The other stumbling blocks cited by Dr. Beggs were the fear of controversy, and confusion on how decisions are made.

"The fear of controversy buries the issues instead of bringing them out into the open," he said. "There is much confusion in people's minds as to how decisions are made. School leaders can provide much help by communicating well at all levels in the community."

Dr. Beggs advised the 400 school board members present that they can foster better relations between the schools and communities if they will "constantly seek to involve more people in community planning and execution."

## What's Happening In Your Township

After attending a meeting of the newly created Oakland County Department of Public Works (DPW) on Thursday last, I have no hesitation in saying that we will have Sanitary Sewers in some parts of our township within 18 months.

The DPW, under the direction of Harold Schone, is leaving nothing undone to get this much needed project started by April or May, 1953. The original plans for Farmington Township called for the system to go as far west as Drake Road. Upon the request of this office, the DPW will now cover the whole 36 square miles from Inkster to Hagerty and from 14-Mile to 8-Mile Road. This does not mean that the complete area will be serviced at once, but rather the more populated sections.

The Master Plan for the township will permit extensions when and where necessary, with emphasis on gravity flow. We can now tell anyone seeking industrial sites that sewage will be available, to say nothing of being able to service the more congested residential areas.

Your Township Board will be meeting with the other governmental units involved in the Farmington Interceptor on October 28, 1952 to discuss further details in regard to financing the areas first served. With the full faith and confidence of Oakland County behind this project, we do not anticipate any difficulty in marketing the bonds necessary to pay for this basic community service.

## Great for Strength

Wood is considered stronger pound for pound than structural steel for most structural uses such as trusses, beams and columns. Man's ingenuity has devised gables to bring wood together into huge structural shapes so strong they withstand vast stresses without breaking. Giant beams and arches, which span 300-foot wide spaces without posts, are made from stout Douglas fir lumber by a gluing process which permits shaping the huge wood timbers into sweeping arches, reports the West Coast Lumbermen's Association.
