In order to point out the diversity of Sousa's musical genius, the band formed a lyre and played several typical selections heard on a Sousa concert. Included among these were an excerpt from "Rosamunde," an opera; "Turkey in the Straw," a folk song; and "Nearer My God to Thee," a church hymn.

Sousa was noted as both a conductor and composer and traveled throughout the country presenting band concerts. His fame spread throughout the world and he was known as "The March King."

With this in mind, the Clarenceville band stepped into its next formation, a crown, to signify Sousa's musical title. The final formation of the evening's concert was the American flag. Each member of the band placed a small American flag at his feet and the band marched off the field leaving an outline of American flags on the field.

40% Residence UF Quota In

A total of \$5,666.90 had been collected up to Tuesday noon by residential solicitors in behalf of the 1957 United Foundation Drive in Farmington City and Township. This represents 39.4% of the residential quota which has been set at \$14,365 for the 1957 campaign in the Farmington area.

The 1957 campaign also includes the American Cancer Society fund raising campaign which last year netted \$3,500 in the Farmington area.
