## Do Your Work Easier, Faster

Tired of standing when you do your kitchen work? Then fix a convenient place to work sitting down, says Norma Landon, Michigan State University home economist.

Plan an area for doing sit-down work. Arrange storage in the area so things are easy to reach while you're sitting. The length of your arm is the maximum distance you can reach without stretching or getting up.

A comfortable chair is a must for sitting work. Get one that lets your feet rest flat on the floor and has a swivel back rest.

To sit and work comfortably you need work surface with knee room. The pull out lap board is handy. If you have one built in your cupboard be sure it's the right height for you. It should just clear your lap when you're sitting in your work chair.

For kitchens that don't have a pull out lap board you can make one and put it where you want it. Little TV tray tables are just about the right height for most homemakers. To give a larger work surface put a piece of plywood or a bread board on top of the tray table. Put cleats in the under side of the board to catch on the tray edges and hold it in place.

If the cupboard has a shallow drawer that pulls out at the right height you can put a bread board on it for a lap board. Or you can use the ironing board if you have one with adjustable height. You'll want to cover it to protect the ironing surface.

Where ever you choose for sitting work be sure you have counter space for parking some of the tools you'll be using. You'll also want to be close to the sink so you can get water easily.

When you bring fresh chicken home from the market, remove the store wrap. Rewrap the chicken loosely in waxed paper so air can circulate. Keep chicken in coldest part of the refrigerator and use within three days.

## Speaks Here at AAUW Meeting

Congresswoman Martha W. Griffiths will speak at an open meeting of the American Association of University Women at 8:00 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 24, at the Farmington Savings Community Room, Orchard Lake at Ten Mile Road.

Mrs. Marvin Schaeffer, legislative chairman, will introduce the speaker who will discuss, "Your Status as a Woman."

Congresswoman Griffiths served as a member of the Michigan House of Representatives (1948-52) and as Judge and Recorder of Recorder's Court, Detroit (1953) before being elected a member of the 84th Congress.

Mrs. Griffiths now serves as a member of the banking and currency committee, and the government operations committee of the House of Representatives. She is an attorney by profession.

Mrs. Griffiths has been honored as one of Michigan's ten best legislators, picked by the capital press corps in 1951; named by the Detroit Free Press as one of the 12 outstanding women of achievement in Detroit for 1953; and was given a Certificate of Merit by the United Church of Women of America, National Council of Churches in 1955.

She was picked by Red Book Magazine, October, 1956, as the "Ten Congresswoman Who Did the Most for Young People" and was re-elected to Congress in November, 1956.

The dinner was given by employees of the Farmington Enterprise as a token of their esteem gained during the tenure of their ownership of the paper.




