His sudden and untimely death cut short his public services and his hope to spend his declining years in retirement with his family.

A devoted, hard-working and conscientious public servant, Mr. Leonard was an educator and practicing lawyer of the State of Michigan for more than thirty-five (35) years.

Born at St. Louis, Michigan, Mr. Leonard made his home in Farmington after attending Central Michigan College, the University of Michigan and the University of Detroit where he obtained his law degree.

He served as Superintendent of Farmington Schools from 1921 to 1922, Assistant Commissioner of Oakland County from 1922 to 1923, and an Assistant Oakland County Prosecutor in 1931-1932. He had practiced law in Farmington since 1929 and served as President of the Oakland County Bar Association.

Mr. Leonard gave to the Township Board and to the Township of Farmington a fine example of a public servant.

We, the members of this Board, realize the inadequacy of words in attempting to recognize the multitude of achievements Archie G. Leonard accomplished for the people of Farmington and Oakland County.

The citizens of this community have been and will be greatly benefited by the leadership and example of Archie G. Leonard's civic leadership and it is, therefore, with a deep sense of loss that we pause to recognize the memory of Archie G. Leonard in the annals of the Township of Farmington.

FARMINGTON MILLS looked like this about 1916, when it was one of the busiest places in town. Before long the steam engine house at right and old smoke stack were torn down, the office and an addition built at side and rear. At this time the Detroit United Railway ran hourly cars right alongside the office, leaving Grand River to go overground to Northville. Earlier when the mill was first started, taxes on the business amounted to from \$4 to \$6 a year.

Oldest Business in Farmington To Close Its Doors Saturday

It is the end of an era for the oldest business in Farmington. This is Farmington Mills, operated by the Gildemeister family for 62 years.

Next Saturday, November 2, the mill closes its doors. It was purchased some time ago as the site for a city community center.

Next time it will be used by the public works department, which would require much change in the old building.

MRS. LEO GILDEMEISTER has operated it alone since her husband died last March. The old mill has quite a history, and was for many years one of the community's most important businesses.

The mill was established here in 1895 by Louis Gildemeister, at the request of farmers in the community wanting a place to sell their excess grain, and have custom grinding done. For 20 years Farmington Mills operated as a merchant flour and custom feed mill.

When Farmington became more densely populated, and farmers raised less grain, the mill changed with the times. The Gildemeisters worked out various feed formulas, and placed their own brands on the feed.

LOUIS GILDEMEISTER the founder, operated the mill from 1895 to 1914. His son Leo R. Gildemeister was with him the last few years, and then assumed operation in 1914, carrying on for 43 years.
