X-Ray Grade Separation East of Novi Finished

Work on a grade separation on the Brighton-Farmington Expressway carrying Meadowbrook Road over the expressway about a mile east of Novi has now been completed. Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie disclosed this week.

Handling construction was the Johnson-Greene Company of Ann Arbor, which held the contract for construction of the reinforced concrete and steel structure which has four spans totaling 108 feet and the laying of a 25-foot wide roadway. Cost of the job was \$121,718.
