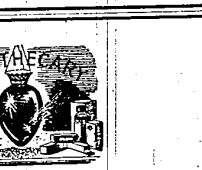

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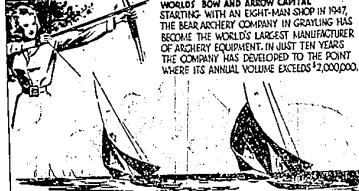
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Assist at College Investiture

State Death Toll Reported Down
October, one of the worst traffic death months of the year, showed a saving of 28 lives on Michigan highways on the basis of provisional figures compiled by the State Police.

The death toll in October of 1956 was 144 as compared with 116 in the same month this year. The latter figure is subject to some revision upward with final reports. Final figures for September show that 128 persons were killed and 5,049 were injured in 14,571 accidents.

It was the lowest death toll for September since 1946, when 123 lost their lives. Compared with September of last year deaths decreased 24 per cent, injuries went down less than one-half per cent, while accidents dropped eight per cent.

For the first 10 months of the year deaths number 1,223, a saving of 220 lives or 15.2 per cent under the total of 1,443 for the same period last year.

The goal for the state this year was a reduction of at least 10 per cent, of 114 under the toll of 1,477 in 1955. Unless there are sharp reverses in November and December this target should be substantially exceeded.

State Police warned, however, that the coming two months are also among the worst, with December being especially deadly because of the combination of bad weather and the holiday season. They urged drivers to renewed effort to avoid accidents.

Reduction in 1958 Boat Motor Prices Revealed

A reduction in outboard motor prices for the 1958 boating season averaging almost ten per cent will be made by the Kiekhafer Corporation of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. It was disclosed last week by Grand River Boat Company at 23928 Grand River, local distributors.

At the same time the company revealed 1958 horsepower ratings for its motors, topped by the new six-cylinder Mark 70 at 70 horsepower. This will be the most powerful outboard in the industry next year, followed by the company's 60 horsepower Mark 75.

The Mackinac Straits bridge provides a minimum clear height at the center of the main span of 148 feet, sufficient to allow passage of the largest ships plying the Great Lakes. The two towers extend to a height of 563 feet above low water, the equivalent of a 48 story office building.

Cranbrook Offers Scholarships
Scholarships up to \$1,500 are now being offered to deserving boys by Cranbrook School, Bloomfield Hills.

Any boy may apply for a grant if he is eligible for entrance into grades seven to eleven next September. In addition applicants should meet the following requirements: above average academic record; good school citizen and leader; and a proven need for financial aid.

Cranbrook is a college preparatory school enrolling 380 boys from all over the United States and several foreign countries. It is one of six non-profit institutions that comprise a cultural and educational center just north of Detroit.

All applications for scholarships must be submitted by March 1 to Headmaster, Cranbrook School, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan.

While there is no fixed number of sizes of grants to be made, a large percentage of Cranbrook students during the school's 30 years, have received financial aid. Under the present scholarship program grants may be renewed until graduation.
