Electronic "Brain" In Use at MSU

MISTIC, a giant electronic "brain" that can work thousands of times faster than a human brain but never without one, is going to work for research at Michigan State University.

Just completed, the new digital computer is an unbelievably complex maze of thousands of circuits, tubes and transistors, strung together by miles of wire. It was painstakingly assembled by a team of M.S.U. staff members in about a year, and looks something like dozens of television chassis stacked one atop another.

The speed with which MISTIC (short for Michigan State Integral Computer) can solve problems makes it an extremely valuable research tool. It will be used to answer problems originating in areas such as physics, mathematics, chemistry, engineering, agricultural economics and many others.

"The importance of the computer to research," according to Dr. Lawrence W. Von Tersch, director of the M.S.U. computer laboratory, is that now we can tackle almost any project we want to. It means we won't have to give up a line of research just because it involves an immense amount of mathematical computation."

"The computer is only as accurate as the information we give it," Dr. Von Tersch explained. "It must be told in detail what to do in its own coded language."
