## New Northwest YWCA Plans Unveiled At Luncheon Here

A model of the new Northwest YWCA building to be erected in this area in the near future was unveiled publicly for the first time at a luncheon at the home of Mrs. Charles Brown at 32742 Twelve Mile, Farmington, last Thursday. The new building which will replace the present small and inadequate quarters of the Northwest YWCA Branch in Redford will be located at 2390 Grand River Avenue between Beech Road and Norborne Avenue on a four acre parcel of land purchased from Mr. and Mrs. Raymond A. Stuckey.

THIS is the first new YWCA building to be constructed in the metropolitan Detroit area since 1932. In the planning stages for over a year, a large number of volunteer women in the Northwest Branch area, as well as YWCA personnel took an active part in the project. Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Donald Fife of 28048 Thorny Brae served on the site committee under the chairmanship of Mrs. Roy Hausler and Mrs. Brown and Mrs. William Loughlin of 25551 Crystal Springs Court on the public relations committee. The public relations committee was under the chairmanship of Mrs. Gordon Neherud of Detroit.

DESIGNED by Yamasaki, Leinweber and Associates, the new YWCA building will be a one-story structure of contemporary architecture with offices, club and activity rooms surrounding a central glass-enclosed inner court.

Architectural plans allow for the possible future addition of a swimming pool and gymnasium in the rear, at some future date.

Funds for the building and the site were allocated to the YWCA by the Metropolitan Detroit Building Fund. Estimated cost of the building is approximately \$300,000, according to Miss Annette B. Eldridge, YWCA Metropolitan Executive Director.

BIDS will be let in January, Miss Eldridge said, and the YWCA hopes to break ground in early spring.

The exterior of the building will feature pink brick and baked enamel with a white concrete roof. Plans call for five offices; three club rooms, including a combination chapel and club room; large lounge with fireplace and adjoining service kitchen which will also serve one of the club rooms; large girls' activity room; combination nursery and teen-center with fireplace and pullman kitchen; snack bar area; large multi-purpose room with catering kitchen and a locker and shower room.

ALL ROOMS will surround a glass-enclosed inner court which can be used for outdoor square dancing and summer parties. The glass-enclosed court will serve also to give the receptionist, at her desk at the main entrance on Norborne Avenue, visual control of all exits and entrances.

Although the building will face Grand River Avenue, the entrance on Norborne will afford easy access from Grand River because of a "turn-around" at the junction of the two streets. A parking area on the YWCA grounds just past the entrance will accommodate 84 automobiles.

THE BUILDING will be situated in the midst of natural beauty, for only one of the many beautiful old trees standing on the grounds will be removed. YWCA officials said: "More than 35 trees and bushes, large maples, elms and birches, and evergreens - will provide the setting for new YWCA."

"The building must be feminine," says Architect Minoru Yamasaki, hence it has been designed to be warm, friendly, light and airy, and functional.

"AND BECAUSE there is a surprise in every woman, this building must have a 'surprise' - which has been created by the glass-enclosed inner court that your eyes will meet upon entering."

Mrs. Donald Brondyke, 25105 Donald, chairman of the board of management of Northwest Branch YWCA, pointed out that the considerations of all women in the northwest area were taken into account by the executive building committee.

"THE NEW building will be available for the use of all community groups," she said, "for there is now a lack of such facilities in northwest Detroit and a great need for a building of this kind."

"We have planned not only with these needs in mind, but also with a look to the future, for a building that will be functional for 20 years."

She pointed out that Northwest YWCA, officially opened in September of 1951, already has a membership of 250 women and more than 15,000 persons participated in its activities.

ACTIVITIES held at the present Branch location, a small two-story building at 17265 Redford Avenue, and through church and school facilities, include programs for children and teenage girls, for homemakers and nursery age tots and for employed adults. They range from club and class activities to monthly coffees for members and their friends.

The area served by Northwest Branch includes Farmington, part of Southfield Township, Redford Township, northwest Detroit west of Greenfield Road, south to Ford and Joy roads, west to Inkster to Haggerty Road, and north to 14 Mile Road.

Branch Executive Director is Mrs. Martha Becker, 15384 Lodi Drive, who came to the Detroit YWCA from the YWCA of Youngstown, Ohio, two years ago.

Northwest Branch YW is one of five branches of the YWCA of Metropolitan Detroit. The others are Central and Lucy Thurman branches, in downtown Detroit; Northern Branch, in Highland Park; and nursery age Branch in Wyandotte. Other units of YWCA operation are located in South Macomb and Southern Oakland counties.

### Has Part in WSU Play "Carousel"
