League Council Plans to Award Sports Trophy

An Inter-Lakes Sportsmanship Trophy was the main topic discussed at the Inter-Lakes Student Council meeting held here last Wednesday, November 6.

Tentative plans for judging sports were developed. All league competitive sports will be included. This year, sports from basketball through the school year will be rated. Next year football and cross-country will be included.

Each sport will be judged differently, with only a few of basketball and football, which will be judged alike.

The following policy will be tried temporarily until the December Inter-Lakes Council meeting. If successful, it will become permanent, with the possibility of further additions.

The judging for basketball will be based on the following things: the spectators — their attitude, spirit, and attendance; the cheerleaders — their courtesy and spirit; the team — their attitude and spirit; coaches — their attitude.

Each of these items will be judged by points from one to five, one being the highest.

One faculty member and one student from each school participating in the game will judge the spectators, cheerleaders, and coaches of each school.

After each game the four judges will meet at the scorer's table and draw up an unbiased rating of each school.

The referees will judge the teams.

The statistics will then be sent to the Inter-Lakes Student Council Secretary at Walled Lake.

Debate Team Holds Practice Session

Driver Trainer Course Completed By 278 Students During First Year

Two hundred seventy-eight Farmington and Our Lady of Sorrows students successfully completed driver's training during the first full year of operation which closed June 30, 1957.

The program is directed this year by Mr. Clayton Graham and Mr. Eugene Freed. The classes held after school are supervised by Mr. Clarence Shewbridge and Mr. Clifford Broderick.

Most of these students have obtained their licenses, except for a few girls and some boys under 16.

Pupils take a series of tests at the beginning of the course to determine their field of vision, depth perception, visual acuity, reaction time, braking efficiency, and ability to drive at night in the headlight glare of oncoming cars.

General Motors has supplied films on safe and proper driving.

At the end of the semester, students must be able to pass a skill test that is taken in the school parking lot. A safe driving certificate is issued to each student who has successfully completed the course.

Only 16 F.H.S. students have failed at quality for such certificates. The biggest reason for these failures was said to be improper or immature attitudes. Pupils who feel that they "know-it-all" or that it's smart to drive recklessly compose this minority group.

Deep Sea Diving Talk Scheduled
