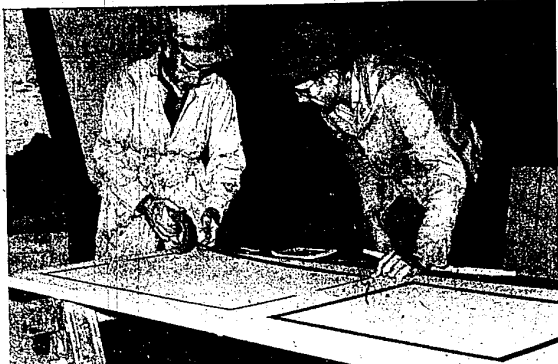

The group has taken a new script from a new author, created original characterizations, built new scenery, conferred with the author and even rewritten parts of the play.

The production, "The Bay Is Green," is from beginning to end a Farmington production even to the furniture used in the settings, part of which was created in the

Farmington workshop of Homestead House.

Writer of the play is Donald A. Yates of Farmington, a drama critic who is now teaching at Michigan State University. Yates studied play-writing under Kenneth Moore of the University of Michigan who also helped develop the talents of playwright Arthur Miller.

Since fostering an interest in play writing is one of the objectives of the Farmington Players, the presentation of "The Bay Is Green" furthers this objective.

The play, to be presented at the Players Barn on 12 Mile at Power Road, will open this weekend, November 15 and 16 and will be repeated again on the following weekend, November 22 and 23. The curtain will come up on each performance at 8:45 p.m.
