To the Editor: It seems to me that a local trucking firm located east of Orchard Lake Road on Shiawassee is being discriminated against by those in charge of getting good streets and such.

As for the 10 mile per hour speed limit, it is highly likely that this speed control will still apply after the road has been paved. It is a general policy in cities and villages to require a lower speed limit for big trucks than cars when traveling through residential neighborhoods.

Why, also is the firm limited to a speed of 10 miles-per-hour on Shiawassee except that it is like a wheelbarrow to drive on?
