Ford Foundation Fund Recipient

One of the more than 6,000 organizations and individuals who have received funds from the Ford Foundation since its establishment in 1936 has been the Sister Kenny Polio Hospital in Farmington.

The local polio hospital has received a total of \$28,500.

The Ford Foundation was established in Michigan by Henry and Edsel Ford as a private, non-profit corporation dedicated to the public welfare. Up until 1950 the Foundation gave its funds largely to Michigan charities. Because of increased funds from the estates of the founders, the foundation was constituted as a nationwide philanthropy.

Funds are now distributed to all 48 states, three territories and in 54 foreign countries.
