

C'ville Accepts Botsford Addition

Botsford Elementary school's addition was formally accepted by the Clarenceville board of education at the regular meeting last Thursday night. The approval was on recommendation of the architects, Eberle M. Smith Associates, and the date of acceptance was set at Feb. 1, 1957.

Groups Study Local College

The study of proposed community colleges for Clarenceville and other nearby communities is going ahead, Superintendent of Schools Louis E. Schmidt reports.

At a meeting last week at Clarenceville school the tentative proposals were presented to representatives of Clarenceville Civic Improvement Association, the North-Livonia Civic Association, and the Heartstone Home Owners Association.

Discussion will come up later at separate meetings of these groups. As part of plans for such colleges in the metropolitan area.

Workers Favor Automation In MSU Study

Most automobile workers prefer automated jobs to those done with less mechanized methods, a Michigan State University survey indicated.

Many workers mentioned dissatisfaction with automation in the survey—one of them being a feeling of isolation on the job—but the majority favored automation.

The study involved interviews with 125 workers in four large machine departments in a highly automated Detroit automobile plant, conducted by William A. Faunce, a U.S. Labor and Industrial Relations Center.

"Preference for automation was due largely to decreased need for materials handling and amount of physical effort required in the automated plant," Faunce reported.

"Automated jobs also were generally regarded as involving more responsibility and some workers felt they were more challenging and interesting."

Changes in social relations cause dissatisfaction with automation, according to Faunce, who said number of workers felt that automation is isolating the worker on the job.

"Machine noise, increasing distance between work stations and need for closer attention to the work is decreasing social interaction among workers," he explained.

Other sources of dissatisfaction mentioned: closer supervision, little chance for discussion of non-job related topics, increased anxiety or tension, faster production, and little chance to use previously learned skills.

Lucky Hunters Urged to Give Information

Deer hunters who bag a white-tail in Michigan this year are urged to cooperate with the Conservation Department in gathering deer information.

Department game biologists will operate regular checking stations at several highway locations in both the upper and lower peninsula.

Other Department workers will conduct "traffic counts" on main north-south highways and secondary roads. The count of deer carried on cars provides a quick estimate of the season kill.

At the regular checking stations, hunters gather information on the amount and composition of the harvest by recording deer age, antler development, sex and other information.

Successful hunters are asked to stop at one of the biological checking stations so these facts can be obtained.

The lower peninsula stations will be in operation early in the season at the following locations: south of Standish on US-23, northwest of Sanford on US-10, south of Mt. Pleasant on US-27, north of Morley on US-131, north of Broham on M-37, and at the Department's district headquarters in Baldwin.

In the upper peninsula, checking stations will be located 10 miles west of the Mackinac Bridge, north of US-2 and at Castle Rock, north of St. Ignace on US-2.

Department workers also will conduct special checks in various areas, including surveys in fields and at locker plants. Other surveys will be underway in many special areas where concurrent "any deer" seasons are scheduled for permit holders.

Winter Bouquet Ideas Suggested

During fall and winter when fresh flowers are scarce, you can still have interesting arrangements around the house, says Miss Luella Nault, Oakland County Home Demonstration Agent.

Nature provides many things for winter bouquets. Pick some dried weeds, grasses or a branch of dried corn stalks and Indian corn or gourds may be used with the arrangements. Some shrubs and bushes with colored berries are also attractive, she said.

Hollow tile and brick can be used as containers. Their texture and colors blend with the materials from nature. Pottery, earthenware, or a bamboo place mat, too, as a shallow basket to hold colorful Indian corn. Add a few small gourds and some clean, brown oak leaves for centerpiece or table arrangement. For a point of interest on a coffee table try some gourds. Arrange smooth textured, or in shades of one color, or a bamboo place mat. Some large "eucalyptus" can be used, too, says Miss Nault. A large arrangement of foliage can be set on the floor by the fireplace or in a corner as an accent in the room. An old, deep crockery pickle jar makes a good container. Set an arrangement of flowers near a light to cast interesting shadows on a plain wall.

Japanese Beetle Threat in State Greatly Reduced During Year

The threat of invasion of the Japanese beetle, an insect that destroys nearly any type of growing vegetation, was materially reduced this year when the trapping program of the Michigan Department of Agriculture's plant industry division produced only one beetle outside of the metropolitan Detroit area, officials reported.

Total beetles trapped amounted to 183, according to the Department's director, G. S. McIntyre, who pointed out one was trapped at the edge of Southfield. The previous year Japanese beetles were also trapped in the Grand Rapids area and in Berrien County.

C. A. Boyer, chief of the plant industry division, explained that the one beetle in the Lansing section was trapped at the time when traps were being taken down to conclude the 1957 program. This was just outside the area which was aerially sprayed in 1955.

"For the first time in several years," said Director McIntyre, "no beetles were trapped in the heavy fruit and vegetable producing regions in southwestern Michigan. This is extremely encouraging."

To date the Department in cooperation with other units has treated a total of 229 acres using hand applications of dieldrin. While Japanese beetle traps capture some of the pests, the real purpose in the trapping program is to detect the presence of the insects. Then a large area around

the trap is sprayed to destroy larvae in the soil which otherwise would emerge in 10 months as an adult beetle.
