

F.H.S. Counselors To Interview College-Freshman

Farmington high school principal James Geiger and counselors Clayton Timmons and Miss Virginia Carley will interview college-bound students at the Farmington State University on December 3 to interview Farmington freshmen currently enrolled there.

Sixteen Farmington students are presently enrolled as freshmen at MSU.

The occasion will be the 21st annual High School and Junior College Follow-Up Conference, sponsored by the M.S.U. offices of high school and junior college community college cooperation.

This conference will seek to improve the understanding, cooperation and articulation between the three levels of education," reports Dr. Guy Hill, director of the office of high school cooperation.

"The annual event has reciprocal benefit—the conference will reveal information that school officials can use to make their high school and junior college programs more effective, and will also present ideas M.S.U. can incorporate to improve its courses."

Tuesday evening, Dec. 3, will be devoted to a professional approach to "Problems in Articulation," Dr. Gordon A. Sabine, dean of the College of Communication, Arts, Dr. Clifford E. Erickson, dean of the College of Education, and Dr. Max S. Smith, director of the office of junior-college cooperation, will conduct the session.

Wednesday morning, Dec. 4, will consist of interviews with spring, summer and fall term, 1957, freshmen and junior college entrants.

A luncheon program presenting Michigan State's efforts to recognize and meet the needs of the "able and ambitious student" will round out the conference.

Sealed bids for the purchase of Building and Site Bonds, Series 2, to be issued by Farmington Public School District, Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, of the par value of \$10,000 will be received by the undersigned, at the office of the Board of Education, 32800 Grand River, Farmington, Michigan, until 8:00 o'clock p.m. Eastern Standard Time, on Monday, the 28th day of December, 1957, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated November 1, 1957, will be coupon bonds in the denomination of \$1,000 each, and will mature serially on the first day of June in each year as follows: \$20,000 in the year 1960, \$30,000 in each of the years 1961 through 1971, \$40,000 in each of the years 1972 through 1974, \$50,000 in each of the years 1975 through 1977, \$60,000 in each of the years 1978 through 1981, and \$70,000 in each of the years 1982 and 1983. Bonds maturing in the years 1968 through 1983 shall be subject to redemption by the school district prior to maturity, in inverse numerical order, on any or more interest payment dates on and after June 1, 1967, at the par value thereof and accrued interest plus a premium on redemption in accordance with the following schedule:

\$25 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1967, but prior to June 1, 1970.

\$20 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1970, but prior to June 1, 1973.

\$15 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1973, but prior to June 1, 1976.

\$10 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1976, but prior to June 1, 1979.

\$5 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1979.

Notice of redemption shall be published not less than 30 days prior to the date fixed for redemption, at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the City of Detroit, Michigan, which carries as a part of its regular service, notices of the sale of municipal bonds. The remaining bonds will not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. Both principal and interest will be payable at such bank or trust company as shall be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds.

The bonds are to be a part of a total authorized issue of \$4,000,000 voted for the purpose of defraying the cost of erecting and furnishing new elementary school buildings, additions to existing elementary school buildings, and an addition to the Senior High School building, remodeling the Junior High School building and erecting and furnishing an addition thereto, and acquiring additional school sites.

In said school district, and will be the general obligations of the school district which is authorized and required by law to levy upon all the taxable property therein such ad valorem taxes as may be necessary to pay said bonds and the interest thereon, without limitation as to rate or amount.

A certified cashier's check in the amount of \$20,000 drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the treasurer of the school district must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No bid shall be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of the unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Berry Stevens & Moorman, attorneys, Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the bonds. The cost of said legal opinion and of the printing of the bonds will be paid by the school district. Bonds will be delivered at Detroit, Michigan.
