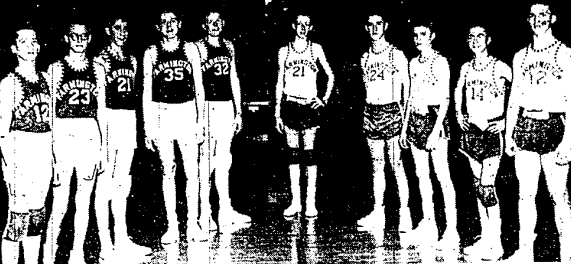
It was a tight contest from start to finish with both teams scrapping hard throughout the game.

Both of the big whitetails were three and one-half years old. The deer were field dressed when weighed.
