Also, it is my sincere hope that not only will the Township as a whole prosper during 1958 but that each of you may reap individual benefits.

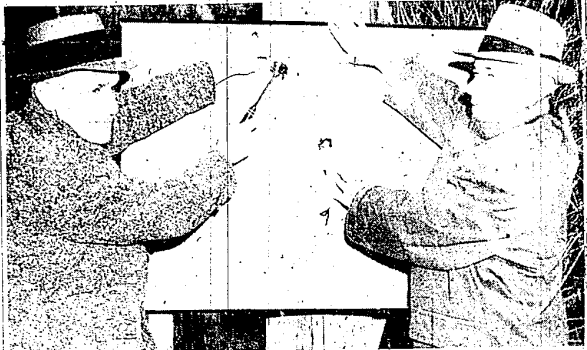

Wood Creek Council Adopts Two Ordinances

As a protective measure, unrevoked versions of both Farmington Township's zoning and building code ordinances were adopted by the Wood Creek Village Council at a special meeting held last Thursday night.

Hurried action was needed since the time for the village to conduct operations under existing Farmington Township ordinances will run out on January 1. As stipulated in the Wood Creek Village Charter at the time of incorporation, the village would function for only a six month interim period under township laws.

President Alger Clark, who proposed the adoption of these two Farmington township ordinances, informed other council members that immediate action was needed since a 20 day period was needed after posting of the ordinances before they could be declared in effect.

These ordinances should give the village ample protection for the time being, President Clark stated. Revisions in the ordinances can be made later if seen to be necessary, he added. Other ordinances can be passed later.

At the present time the village is controlling the installation of culverts and preventing the blocking of drainage ditches and the other setting up a planning commission.

"Homemaker of Tomorrow" Contest Has 34 Farmington High Entries

Thirty-four Farmington High home economics students participated in the "Homemaker of Tomorrow Day" observance held throughout the United States earlier this month.

They along with 327,000 other graduating girls in schools across the nation took a 59-minute written examination to test their home-making knowledge and attitudes. The testing locally was done by Mrs. Edward Deegan, homemaker teacher at F.H.S. Taking the test were: June Balcom, Gail Bates, Narelene Bogusky, Dorothy Catherine, Judith Clappison, Jacquelyn Fletcher, Joy Forke, Angie Grace, Kathleen Harris, Nancy King, Diane O'Leary, Mary Salley, Mary Oliver, Judy Smith, Linda Swartz, Sharon Upchurch, Beverly Williams, Judy Cooley, Pat Crandall, Helen Denington, Nancy Dwyer, Betty Ellis, Patricia Grand, Terrell Houston, Steven Mauseau, Sandy Netto, Viola Pratt, Linda Sadula, Judy Sharpe, Rose Mary Soudy, Louise Machan, Kathy Rinsheigh, Sandra Hart and Sandra Loh.

The tests have been given annually for the past four years by General Mills in their yearly Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Scholarships totaling \$100,000 are being offered this year.

The girl with the highest score in the examination, which consists of multiple choice and subjective questions testing the students' attitudes and knowledge in 10 major areas of homemaking, will be named Homemaker of Tomorrow for her school. She will receive an award pin designed by Trifari of New York and her test will then be entered in competition for \$500 and \$500 scholarships which will be awarded each state Homemaker of Tomorrow and the runner-up, respectively. The school of each state winner will receive a complete set of the Encyclopedia Britannica and an honor certificate.

The 48 state winners and representative from the District of Columbia will receive an expense-paid educational tour to Washington, D.C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., and New York, where on April 17 at a banquet in the Waldorf-Astoria hotel one of them will be announced as the 1958 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. Girls who rank second, third and fourth in the national finals will receive \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships, respectively.

"The Betty Crocker Search is a scholarship program, but it is also

much more," declares Charles H. Bell, president of General Mills. "It is a broad plan for providing a rich educational experience to all high school senior girls. Its materials, prepared with the advice and help of teachers, is designed for immediate and practical use in several subject areas."

Each girl taking the examination received a homemaker profile which serves as an aid to self-analysis on problems facing high school girls today. Teachers in the schools enrolled received guidebooks from General Mills which will serve as teaching aids.

Revised State Ski Map Out

A revised edition of a state-wide ski map and winter sports guide has been released by the Michigan Tourist Council.

Some 50 thousand copies will be distributed throughout Michigan and the Midwest during the season, according to Robert J. Farlow, Council executive secretary.

Main feature of the folder is a 17 x 22 inch map which pinpoints locations of the 64 winter sports areas and a listing of facilities offered by each. Fourteen of the areas are in the upper peninsula, 23 in west Michigan, 21 in east Michigan and six in the southeast portion of the state. Nine of the winter sports centers are new this year.

pplies of the Michigan winter sports map-guide are available free of charge from the Tourist Council, Lansing, 26.
