another \$14,000,000 just to handle increased enrollments.

Both sides agree new taxes will be impossible this year with three groups still conducting studies to determine the impact of taxes on business and industry and how to realign the entire revenue structure.

Without saying so, both sides also are looking to 1958 as an election year.

Labor Unions face another attack on their autonomy in the economy during the 1958 session of the legislature.

Senator Robert E. Faulkner (R-Colo.) plans a bill requiring unions to incorporate and become subject to the same regulations and laws governing incorporated business and industries.

These include periodic audits of their books and a requirement that no corporation can make direct political contributions.

An added feature of Faulkner's proposal, he said, will be a ban on the secondary boycott, a union tactic barring members from buying the products of a struck plant.

Faulkner, chairman of the Senate Labor committee, is considering a right-to-work law for Michigan — the long-feared, and long-fought foe of labor unions in all states.

It would enable a worker to work without the requirement of joining a union, knocking out the union shop in which an employe must join to stay on the job.

Neither is expected to pass this year, but the pressure is on now.

Questionnaires On Incomes Out To State "Vets"

More than 25,000 Michigan veterans, widows and children receiving Veterans Administration non-service - connected disability or death pension will get annual income questionnaires soon.

Lloyd H. Jameson, manager of the VA office in Detroit, said the questionnaires have now been placed in the mail.

He urged those receiving the questionnaires to fill in all entries and return the completed papers without delay.

"Otherwise," he said, "regulations require that we stop pension payments in any case where the questionnaire is not returned to us within 30 days."

Mr. Jameson explained the questionnaire requests dated in 1957 in 1958 and the law which stipulates that any person whose annual income exceeds \$1,400 without dependents or \$2,700 with dependents shall not be entitled to pension.

Farmington School Bus Drivers All Take Special Training Courses

Farmington school bus drivers, through the Michigan School Bus Driver Education Program, receive special training in order to provide the greatest possible protection for the children they transport.

The courses are offered by Michigan State University; Western Michigan University; Central Michigan College; Northern Michigan College; and Eastern Michigan College.

Both beginner and advanced courses are offered each year with all of the newer and less experienced drivers being enrolled as soon as a course of training is offered in the area, Assistant Superintendent of Schools James Reed said.

Course instruction includes first aid; safe driving practices, a study of the Michigan Vehicle Code, training in emergency procedures and the role of the school bus driver in the total education program. Training aids, films and practical demonstrations are used during the classroom training programs, it was pointed out.

The initial bus driver education program was launched during the 1949-'50 school year by Michigan State University and Central Michigan College at the request of the Michigan Department of Public Instruction. Northern and Eastern Michigan Colleges later joined in offering such programs as did Western Michigan University.

In commenting on the driver education program, Michigan State University officials pointed out several factors to emphasize the need and effectiveness of this program.

Figures indicate that there are now more than 5,300 school buses operating in the state and that they are traveling more than 45,000,000 miles each year. Also pointed out was the fact that over 285,000 children are transported each day. Since 1946, officials said, vehicle registration has doubled, total mileage by all vehicles has doubled and the number of school buses in operation has nearly tripled.

In spite of the greater number of buses and cars on the road and the increasing number of young-

sters of school age, fatalities of youngsters in accidents involving school buses has remained relatively constant since 1949 when the total number killed in school bus accidents was three.
