**Autorama to Run Jan. 10, 11, 12; Local Resident a Co-Chairman**

Entries including some 150 hot rods and antique cars and more than 100 sports cars will be displayed at the sixth annual Autorama which opens a three-day showing at the State Fairgrounds this Friday, January 10, and continues through Sunday, January 12.

The exhibits have a value of close to two million dollars and the list is topped by the world's championship Mercedes-Benz, loaned to the Autorama by the Ford Museum, which is valued at \$295,000.

This year's event is being sponsored jointly by the Michigan Hot Rod Association and the Michigan Sports Car Club and the entire proceeds are divided between the two non-profit organizations to carry on their year-round programs aimed at finance.

Ron Radloff, 25307 Ivanhoe, Redford and Don Houck 33870 Quaker Valley, Farmington, members of the MHRHA Board of Directors, are serving as co-chairmen for their group and the Michigan Sports Car Club (exhibits are under the supervision of Ed Lawrence, 13715 Mulberry, Wyandotte and Bob Beemer, 5550 Poplar Lane, Birmingham as co-chairmen.

In past years the Autorama has been sponsored only by the MHRHA. In the first place, it is a show of only hot rods and sports cars—but none are for sale. Each car exhibited is the property of the exhibitor and each represents hours and in many cases years of work in reconstructing the sleek, highly polished cars.

Many of the hot rods and all of the antiques are for show purposes only and seldom are used on the highways. The owners take particular delight in placing their masterpieces in competition against the best from all other sections of the state.

And some of the hot rods are worth considerable cash in the eyes of the owner who sees the completion of a dream and in some instances as many as six years of hard work.

Just to add test to a show that already packs zip for those interested in such models, the sports car exhibits include all the various models from France, Germany, Spain, Italy, England and Mexico. And there'll be antiques, dating as far back as 1902 and all in working condition.

The sports cars include models that range in valuation from as low as \$1,200 and as high as \$20,000.

A partial list of models scheduled for exhibition includes: one of which set a record at Elkhart, Lake, Wis. last summer in the Road America competition; 208NS Slats from Italy; Alfa-Romeo from Milan, Italy; and Accia coupe from the past.

termining the uses of atomic energy on the farm.

It will be the state's first attempt to get into the atomic energy field.

Processors, producers, transporters and others who come into contact with atomic energy in the state would be required to get a license from the state in addition to the Federal government.

**MORE MONEY** for local health departments will be sought from the legislature before spring.

It will be one of the top-priority projects of the state health department which this year, has an organized pressure group at its elbow.

More than 100 of its leaders met in Lansing late in 1957 to establish the priority list and pledge their support to the health department budget for 1958-59.

**FARM LAWS** to be proposed by the governor this year will be highlighted by his Seal of Quality proposal — defeated every year since he took office in the legislature.

The theory is to establish standards of all Michigan farm products and to identify those which meet them with a seal for advertising purposes through the nationwide market.

More support for the "Seal" idea than in the past is evident. Since many farm organizations have endorsed it for the first time, it has a better chance of becoming law.

There will be a milk-marketing bill in the 1958 legislature, proposing the creation of a special state system for fixing milk prices.

However, the major farm groups are opposed to any state regulation and it is expected to die.
