Local Officials To Attend Twp. Assn. Convention

Representing Farmington Township at the fifth annual convention of the Michigan Township Association to be held at Olds Hotel in Lansing on January 14, 15 and 16 will be Treasurer Elise Avery and Clerk Floyd Coates.

Both plan to remain here for the regular Township Board meeting Tuesday night, January 14, and then go on to take part in convention activities on Wednesday and Thursday. It was indicated that other township officials may also attend at least portions of the convention.

Main speaker at the principal banquet on the convention program Wednesday evening will be Dr. Carl G. Winters, minister of the First Baptist Church in Oak Park, Illinois.

Dr. Winters has achieved a national reputation as one of America's great lecturers and humorists and has lectured at innumerable colleges, universities and high schools as well as many national conventions. On a recent study and lecture trip he spoke to business and educational groups in Manila, Tokyo, Yokohama, Bangkok, Rangoon, Calcutta, New Delhi, Hong Kong, Cairo, Rome, Paris and London.

Dr. Winters speaks from a broad background of human experience as former Crime Commissioner of Michigan; five years as chairman of the Skid Row Commission of Chicago; advisor on the Juvenile Board of Sheriff Lohman of Cook County, Illinois and as a personal counselor. He is in his 19th year as Minister of the First Baptist Church of Oak Park.

The title of Dr. Winters' address will be "What's right with America?" He is expected to humorously illustrate how to under-stand strength and guarantee our unique way of life.

Toastmaster for the evening will be Senator Frank D. Beadle, member of the Michigan Senate from St. Clair.

Little Steak On Steer, Market Costs Run High

Why does choice round steak cost about 89 cents a pound at the corner butcher shop when farmers get only about 25 cents a pound for choice cattle?

If your answer says the difference is due to marketing costs and that only a small part of the animal is steak, you're right. Michigan State University agricultural economists asked consumers in Muskegon that question recently. But only 10 per cent of about 150 homemakers gave the above answer. Almost a fifth of the homemakers said they did not know although two blamed the difference on politicians.

Researchers also asked the homemakers what the term "U.S. Choice Beef" meant. Only three per cent gave the correct answer - government graded meat which was next to the highest grade.

Bread Stuffing

Detroit Consumer Marketing Information Agents suggest you allow one and one-half slices of bread for each serving of stuffing. Or, allow three slices for each pound of poultry, dressed weight.

For best taste and appearance bread stuffing, cut or tear bread into uniform sized pieces. Crusts and end slices of fresh or day-old bread serve well in stuffing. Crustings are best when they are packed lightly to give room for expansion in cooking.
