

### Says Education Too Dependant On Sales, Real Estate Taxes

More important than federal aid to education is the need to minimize the importance of real estate and sales taxes in education and find a broader base for financing such community services.

Congress should search for ways to encourage individual states to provide sources of revenue with which to finance local education.

"The federal government now subsidizes education in many ways. Although there may be heated controversy over current proposals, it seems necessary and very likely that both state and federal expenditures for education should increase if there is to be any hope of meeting the growing demands for educational services."
