The Steiger's other daughters are Maria, 3½, and Mirla, 1½.

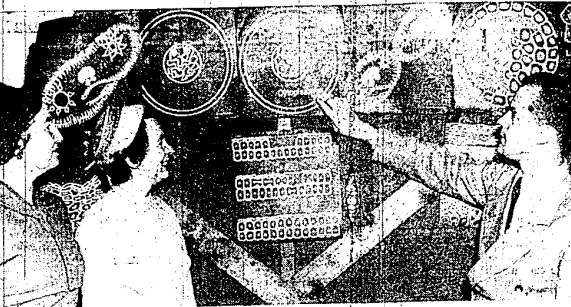
Mr. and Mrs. Herb MacClaren had a neighborhood get-together at their home on Hawberry Road Saturday evening, January 4.
