The Falcons were in command from the beginning, as Don Margherini, Don Hendryx, Tom Peckham, Randy Jordan, Jim Marsh, Jerry Carrel, and Amos Deason scored successive pins.

Frank DePodesta then won a 6-3 decision followed by pins by Ron Jordan and John Clark.

In the 135 pound class, Dennis Van Sickling of Walled Lake saved his team from a whitewashing by winning a hard-fought 16-10 decision from Don Restler of Farmington. John McCamy, Falcon heavyweight, added a finishing touch to the rout by winning a 3-0 decision.

The encounter with Walled Lake was the first this season in which the Falcons scored well in the heavier weight divisions.

The Falcons also wrestled at Garden City on Tuesday. Results were not available at press time. Tonight they will wrestle at Royal Oak-Kimball at 7:30 p.m. The next home meet will be Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in the F.H.S. gym against Thurston.
