## Report Career Conferences Well Attended

The Career Conferences which are being held during homerooms have proven to be very worthwhile thus far, stated Mr. Clayton Timmons, counselor.

A survey taken during the preceding weeks shows that a reasonable number of students have had enough interest to attend.

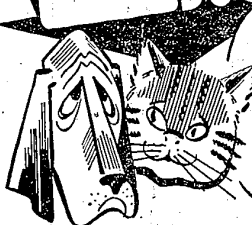
