Stationed With Navy At New Base In Spain

Wayne State University conferred degrees on 1957 January graduates during commencement exercises Tuesday in the Masonic Temple auditorium.

Local students included in the list of degree candidates were: Leila M. Dr. Clarence B. Hilberry, University president, conferred the degrees. A total of 19 candidates receive doctorates. In addition to doctorates, the Graduate School will award 45 other degrees.

A total of 412 received degrees from the College of Education. The College of Liberal Arts will graduate 250. Other totals are: Law School, 20; College of Pharmacy, 15; College of Nursing, 31; School of Business Administration, 93; College of Engineering, 73.

Four honorary degrees were also conferred by Dr. Hilberry. The "Declaration of Civic Loyalty" will be read by Arthur Neff, vice president and professor.

The Wayne State Symphony Orchestra will play for the ceremonies, directed by Dr. Valter Poole, associate professor of music.

Takes Part in Marine Landing Exercise

Marine Pfc. Glen D. Petty, son of Mr. and Mrs. Heliard Petty of 21620 Oxford Street, Farmington, took part in an air-ground landing exercise by units of the First Marine Division, at Camp Pendleton, Calif., from January 11 - 24, the Marine Corp disclosed.

The main assault force, made up of the 7th Regiment, landed on D-Day, January 20, and engaged the "enemy" forces.

Four days prior to D-Day, the forces landed on San Clemente Island, 45 miles off the Southern California coast, to seize an airfield needed to accommodate close support aircraft and helicopters.

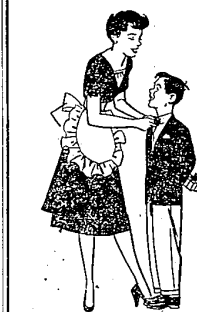
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
