On January 21, the Oakland County Board of Supervisors voted to place the full faith and credit of the county behind the Interceptor bonds. This action by the board was a real public service and I thanked them on behalf of the citizens of Farmington Township. On Saturday, January 18, a meeting of the builders and the Michigan Corporation and Securities Commission, along with your bishop's department, was held. Only two builders attended this very important "get together." This is some evidence of the total lack of concern for cooperation on the part of these gentlemen. We are now working on our 1958 budget. I hope that all of you people living in areas with dirt roads will attend the annual township board meeting and support a budget containing an appropriation for at least two pieces of road maintenance equipment. The township has miles of local roads and the Oakland County Road Commission cannot and will not maintain this mileage. Let's help ourselves by better motoring in the township.

Obtain New Wilderness Camp Site On Au Sable For Area Boy Scouts

Local Boy Scouts and Explorers will be able to attend a new camp this summer, scout officials stated. Camp Agawam, near Lake Orion, will still be operating at capacity, but the Clinton Valley Boy Scout Council has just obtained a new 20 acre site on the Au Sable River for use as a base for adventure camping, they announced. Called Ausagawam, which combines Au Sable with Agawam, it is located in Osceola County, six miles east of Mio. It is on high ground and on a bend in the river. Council President John W. Hunt of Farmington said that he has visited the site and found the fast water to be ideal for canoeing and fishing. He also indicated that Ausagawam would be kept in its present wilderness condition to provide new outdoor experiences for the Council's older Scouts and Explorers. Expected to be ready for use in early summer, this new base was chosen after about eight years of seeking "the right" location, Hunt explained. He said that Camp Agawam does not have sufficient space now for the Council's growing numbers of boys and the expanding programs of activities. Ausagawam, with its 600 feet of frontage on the Au Sable River, is the perfect site for an outpost type of camp, he said. The Council will install a well for drinking water and eventually construct a building for the storage of equipment. Rigid rules will be made regarding the amount of supervision necessary when Scouts use the base. Clinton Valley Boy Scout Council has about 3,600 boys and 3,000 leaders in its area which includes northern Oakland and Macomb Counties.

Annual Report Township Police Force Kept Busy With Variety of Duties in 1957

Duties performed by members of the Farmington Township police department were many and varied during 1957. Statistics released by Police Chief Irving Yaltes here this week in performing those many duties policemen traveled 102,990 miles and answered a total of 5,015 counter complaints, Yaltes commented. One of the most frequent duties police officers were called on to perform was that of issuing summonses. A total of 443 were issued by the department during the year. Investigating automobile accidents throughout the township was another major activity. A total of 210 were handled by the township force. Of this number 155 were property damage accidents and 61 personal injury accidents, one of which was a fatality. Twenty-five were arrested in the township during the year for driving under the influence of liquor and an equal number for reckless driving. The force also investigated ten stolen car reports and recovered four vehicles which had been taken. Stolen bikes reported in the township totaled four. Simple larceny cases totaled 91 and grand larceny cases 37. Breaking and entering investigations were made at 43 homes and business places and 63 complaints of malicious destruction of property answered. One of the department's biggest assignments during the year in this category was the investigation of the daytime armed bank robbery at the Detroit Bank and Trust Company on Grand River during October. Eight attempted suicides were reported to the township police force for investigation during the year. Yaltes said. Members of the force were called out on 59 cases of consuming and possession and on three cases of drunk and disorderly conduct. Also handled were five cases of assault and battery. Calls on 83 domestic incidents were handled by the police department. Members of the force also arrested 22 on charges of hunting illegally in the township.
