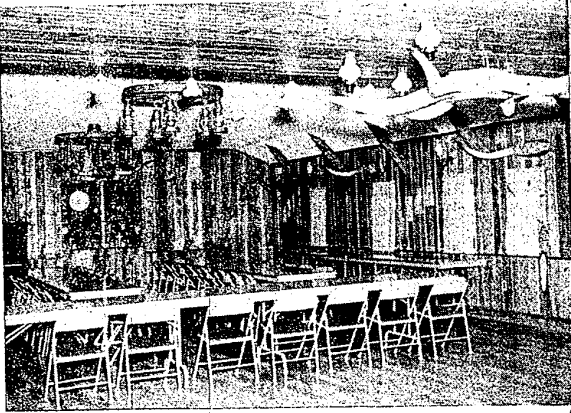

Warmie Cypress siding used in the interior walls and portions of the ceiling in the banquet room and in other portions of Frontier Town help to carry out the old west motif of the building. Adding to this are the Longhorns and old lamps and lanterns hanging from the ceiling and adorning the walls.



"Frontier Town" Adds Real Touch of Old West Here

The recent opening of "Frontier Town" at Guffin's King of Beef brought to Farmington another true touch of the old west. It follows the western theme to an even greater degree than does the house of beef which was opened earlier last year.

Located directly behind the King of Beef establishment on Grand River just west of the eastern terminus of the new Farmington-Brighton Expressway route, the western motif is carried out throughout the building. The building was planned and designed jointly by landlord Vance Kefgen

and Joe Guffin copying ideas which Kefgen has picked up from buildings he had seen in western villages and towns in Texas and Arizona on past visits there.

The main portion of the building is 60 feet wide by 110 feet long. The divided banquet room which is designed to accommodate parties, weddings, club meetings, luncheons and other types of gathering ranging in numbers attending from 25 to 250. The need for such a banquet room in this area prompted the construction of the building, Guffin stated.

Toward the west end of the building is a gift shop operated by Chief Redbird, a full-blooded Indian who is on hand each Saturday and Sunday offering a complete line of Indian supplies for wholesale and retail sale. Chief Redbird, a performer on TV and radio in past years, also provides some entertainment for his visitors. He has his own band and a young Indian girl who does the "shorty dance." The chief has also agreed to work with local Cub Scout and Boy Scout units on any of their Indian programs or projects whenever possible, Kefgen added.

At the extreme west end of the building is the coat and hat check room.

The walls throughout the building are paneled with warmie Cypress lumber and adorned with numerous Longhorns. Portions of the ceiling are also finished in warmie Cypress and the remainder in acoustical tile. Longhorns and wagon wheels hang from the ceiling holding lanterns and specially designed lamps.

Old western items on display in the building include two water pumps which are over 100 years old and a true western gambling table equally as old. Hitching posts will be put up in the near future in front of the building, Guffin stated.

Present groups using the new facilities for their meeting places include the Greater Farmington Chamber of Commerce, Exchange Club, Shrine Club, Oakland County Police Chief's Assn. and Oakland County Assessors Association.
