might slow down union activity, do not "bust" unions. At present 19 states have such laws, some of them for 10 years or more. Two experts in the labor field were unable to point to a single union which ceased to exist because of the laws.

Much union progress, on the other hand, has been reported in the southeast part of the country where right to work laws have been in existence for the longest period of time. It will be interesting to see what both sides of the right to work argument make of the labor picture in states where the law has been in operation.

Secrecy in government on all levels is under attack in the 1958 legislative session.

Son, Frank D. Beadle (R-St. Clair) is sponsoring a bill to open meetings of all public bodies and make their records open to public scrutiny.

Gov. Williams is interested in a similar administration bill.

The idea is pushed hard by the Michigan Press Association which has been fighting for years for the "people's right to know" about the agencies which spend the tax money, and by Sigma Delta Chi, a professional journalism fraternity.

Williams is taking a two way approach—stating that the right to know about government has another side—the editor's responsibility in presenting the information.

Simultaneously Williams brought out the point that some records must remain secret. They include adoption records and certain business records of the state insurance department.

Lawmakers, while not contesting this, say the major problem is on the local level.

Politics is gaining momentum far in advance of the 1958 election next fall. Rep. George W. Salfade (of Ann Arbor) is ready to announce his non-alien candidacy for governor on the Republican ticket.

Salfade, one of the original party supporters at the moment, but he is the first of the Republicans to even hint at making the race next fall.

There has been a notable restraint in getting a Republican candidate. Old timers are leery of trying to "draft" a prominent citizen, and aside from Salfade none of the younger and lesser knowns have made the first move.

The Democratic picture has not changed in months.

Williams is expected to try for his sixth term and Lt. Governor Philip Haff is expected to announce his candidacy for the United States Senate seat now held by Sen. Charles Potter.

Sen. John B. Swainson (D-Detroit) is already a top Democratic choice to succeed Hart.

housing, depending on family income, old age pension; burial subsidy, and so forth.

Money for these "benefits" come from the people themselves, of course. The very people who receive the subsidies must pay for them in taxes, plus the bureaucracy to administer them, since the onetime wealthy group has been all but taxed out of existence.

Clever Deception
However, the Socialist propagandists, who are along with the Communists the most clever "brain washers" in the world, have kept most of the wage earners believing that the Government itself is somehow creating wealth and dispensing the tidbits of economic welfare "free." The Conservative Parties in these Socialist countries appear to be incapable of breaking down this myth.

As you have said for 20 years, Dr. Benson: once a nation votes Socialism into control, bit by bit or all at once, the chances of its returning to Capitalism and the great advantages Capitalism creates, is slim indeed. In the Welfare States of Europe is the living proof. And this is so important to our own people in America, where "back door Socialism" is trying constantly in many cunning ways to expand its considerable following.

William D. Segula of Farmington was among those in attendance at the 35th annual Post-Graduate Conference for Veterinarians held at Michigan State University the latter part of January.

Practicing veterinarians and university students from many midwestern states heard about advances in the treatment of farm and home animals.

"This year's conference assumes a special significance in view of the many scientific and economic changes of the past year," points out Dr. W. W. Armistead, dean of the M.S.U. College of Veterinary Medicine.

"The Russian development of satellites capable of carrying living passengers, the frightening lag in the training of United States scientists and engineers and the pendency of hunger as a political weapon in countries on the Soviet fringe are typical of these changes," he said.

"All of these forces, so prominent in the news of the past year, have served to reemphasize the importance of round veterinary medicine to our future comfort and safety."

The conference was held concurrently with the annual Alumni Day Session of the sponsoring College of Veterinary Medicine.

More than 200 veterinarian graduates returned to the East Lansing campus for the two-day event.

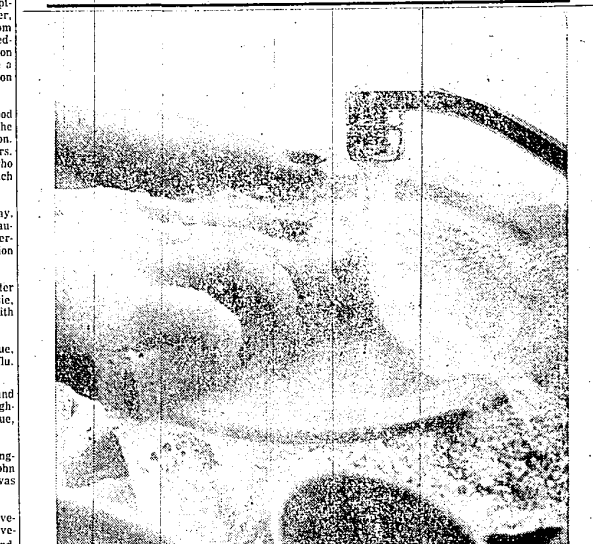
