Feels Dog Laws Just

Dear Sir:

We believe that the Michigan law concerning dogs is perfectly just. While we are extremely against cruelty to animals, we are more against treating human beings wrongly. Why shouldn't property owners have a right to shoot a dog that trespasses on his property if the dog proves to be a nuisance? The dog would not be what happened to him, therefore not cruelty, and the property owner would be protecting his property which may be worth many times the value of the dog.

Certainly, we are considering only extreme cases and do not condone the shooting of any and every animal that merely walks on the lawn. Many dogs are not bad, and many dog-owners would not have their animals getting into trouble.

It is generally agreed, even by some dog-owners, that the canine animals are more troublesome than any other domesticated animal. How many times have we heard complaints about dogs running property, endangering children and small animals, and making unnecessary noise! These wrongs could be eliminated if all dog-owners would cooperate, but too many of them get sore if someone as much as frowns on their pets.

If we had a law that would require dog owners to keep their animals at home, except when held by a leash, and to keep them quiet, then another nuisance would be eliminated. People who don't care about their neighbors should not live amongst them. The Golden Rule is the best motto.

Bond-Eagle Emergency Blood Bank Scheduled

An emergency blood bank has been scheduled for the latter part of this month in the Bond-Eagle Blood bank district, area volunteer workers for the American Red Cross blood bank program disclosed this week.

The bank will be held on Monday, February 24, at the O. E. Dunckel Junior High with blood donations being taken between the hours of 3 to 5 and 6 to 9 p.m.

The supply of blood in Oakland County and throughout the whole Detroit metropolitan area is getting dangerously low and every possible effort must be made to replenish this supply, Red Cross officials said. Because of the sharp drop in employment in plants in the area, most large industrial plants have canceled their present scheduled blood banks. A large supply of the blood donated has in the past come from these industrial blood banks, they said.

Appointments can be made in advance but all donors will be welcomed at the local bank regardless of whether or not they have made an appointment, local volunteer blood bank workers commented.

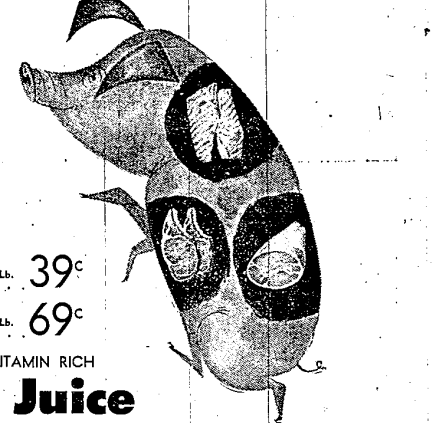
