The Falcons ended the first quarter with a promising lead of four points to make the score 18-14.

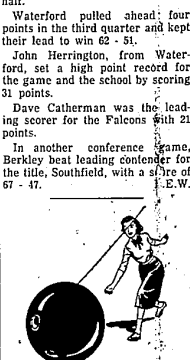
In the second quarter the Skippers slowly began to edge their way to tie the Falcons 33-33 by the half.
