Motion by Hug, supported by Fisher, that the Minutes stand as read. Carried, unanimous.

Minutes of Special Meeting held on January 18th read by Clerk.

Motion by Fisher, supported by Westlake, that the Minutes stand as read with correction in amount of salary—should be \$5500 with \$300 car allowance, for Mr. Heffernan, assistant in Assessor's Office. Carried, unanimous.

Motion by Brown, supported by Hug, that matter of severance requested in Glenn Oaks Sub. be referred to Legal Department for study and recommendation on question of whether or not we have

Motion by Westlake, supported by Avery, that \$4750 be appropriated by the Township to pay expenses of representative of Township to Wolverine Boys State for 1958. Carried: 6 Yeas, Mr. Brown not voting.

Motion by Fisher, supported by Avery, that Mr. Fred Westlake be appointed, as representative of the Township Board, to sit with the American Legion representative to select the boy to represent the Township for 1958. Carried.

Motion by Brown, supported by Cairns, that the matter of Industrial Zoning Resolution be placed on the agenda for next regular meeting of Township Board, and in the meantime the Legal Department will prepare the proper Resolution which will refer to the industrial area, and at the same time we pass on the proposed Regulations. Carried.

Motion by Brown, supported by Hug, that we adopt the recommendation of the Planning Board and the appointment of Read, Downing and Freeman to Planning Board, three incumbents, for three-year terms. Roll Call Vote: 4 Yeas, 8 Nays. Avery, Fisher and Cairns. Carried.

Motion by Brown, supported by Fisher, that the Treasurer and the Auditor be appointed to improve of office divider, and submit the bids to the Board for action when ready. Carried, unanimous.

Motion by Avery, supported by Brown, that we approve the re-investment by Treasurer of the sum of \$75,000.

Motion by Avery, supported by Fisher, that we authorize the Township Clerk to make a split of Precincts 4 and 6. Roll Call Vote: 7 Yeas. Carried.

Motion by Brown, supported by Cairns, that this legal proceeding brought by Mrs. Keller be referred to Legal Department for such action as they deem fit and proper for the defense of the Township, and the Township Attorney be instructed to resist this. Mrs. Keller to the best of their ability. Roll Call Vote: 7 Yeas. Carried.
