### 1957 A Record Road Building Year in County

A record year for road construction in Oakland County for 1957 was reported recently in a joint statement made by Road Commissioners Sol D. Lomerson, Robert O. Felt and Lee O. Brooks.

They stated that a total of \$1,210,000 had been spent during the year on 24 projects on both the county primary and county local road systems. A total of 30 miles of work was included in these programs.

The only project completed in Farmington Township listed in the report was the grading and laying of gravel surfacing on Farmington Road between 10 and 12 Mile Roads.

Expenditures for maintenance and repair on the 700 miles of county primary roads ran about \$220,000 or an average of \$183 per mile. Maintenance on county local roads, covering approximately 1,900 miles, cost nearly \$880,000 or an average of \$463 per mile. Off this expense, it was indicated in the report, \$160,000 was paid for by individuals wanting calcium chloride on their streets or new driveway curbs installed.

It was indicated that the road commission was reimbursed by the State Highway Department for maintenance of the 183 miles of county primary roads within the county an amount of \$343,500 or an average of \$2,400 per mile.

"The road commission does not receive enough funds for the county's local road system to provide all the services the public would like or that the commission would like to give. Any road work and above necessary maintenance is usually dependent on the willingness of the interested parties, or in some cases the townships, to pay the cost," the commissioners' report concluded.

The Farmington Library reports that a number of non-fiction titles have been added recently that should prove of reader interest in a variety of fields—partial listing includes:

Henry A. Kissinger—"Nuclear Weapons and Foreign Policy." A probing, intelligent, and challenging discussion of problems presented by the atomic breakthrough.

Arthur C. Clarke—"The Making of a Moon." Authoritative account of the construction and launching of earth satellites and what we may expect to gain from them.

U.S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare—"Education in U.S.S.R." 222 page study of Education in Russia today based principally on official documentation.

David Steinman—"Miracle Bridge at Mackinac." The story of the world's largest suspension bridge told by the engineer whose masterful design made the bridge reality. Written in collaboration with the reporter who was on the job daily, John Nevill. Copiously illustrated with charcoal drawings, charts, graphs, and photographs.

Norman Beasley and George W. Stark—"Made in Detroit." In true George W. Stark vein.

Edgar Alexander—"Adenauer and the New Germany." A clear depiction of the role of the Chancellor in the regeneration of the vanquished nation.

Arnold Toynbee—"A Study of History"—2 Vol. abridgement by D. C. Somervell of Toynbee's 10 vol. work (An analysis of the rise and fall of civilizations).

Ramon Jimenez—"Selected Writings"—translated by H. R. Hays. Collection of poems and prose pieces by the 1956 winner of The Nobel Prize for Literature.

Frances Parkinson Keyes—"The Land of Stones and Saints." The story of Avila in Old Castile Province during the Renaissance, and the personages who made it so colorful.

Waldo Frank—"Bridgehead and the drama of Israel." A clear presentation of the heart of the young state, the spirit of its people, and its relation to the world and to mankind.

Winston Churchill—"Age of Revolution." This is volume 3 of Churchill's 4 volume History of the English Speaking People, dealing with the period 1688 - 1815.

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### County GOP '58 Campaign Kickoff Scheduled Feb. 18

Heads of the state Republican Party will help Oakland County Republicans "kick-off" their 1958 political campaign at a public meeting Tuesday, February 18, 8:15 p.m., in the auditorium of the County Office Building, No. 1 Lafayette, Pontiac.

On hand to report Party accomplishments to date and objectives for '58 will be: John Martin, National Committeeman; Larry Lindemer, State Chairman; and State Finance Chairman, Don E. Ahrens.

In addition to the state leaders, speakers will include: State Senator Harvey Lodge; Farrell Roberts, State Legislator; County Register of Deeds, Dan Murphy; Art Elliott, County Chairman; and Jack Gibbs, Executive Secretary of the County Committee.

Art Elliott, County Chairman, emphasized that "we mean to lay it on the line at this meeting because we have a tremendous job to do. Since I've been County Chairman, dozens of people have asked me what 'we' Republicans are doing. Well, this meeting will give everyone a chance to see what 'we' are doing and how they 'can take part', he said.

Elliott said, "we've learned from the Democrats that you have to campaign year-round to win elections, so we are starting early this election year." "There will be a short question and answer period," he said, "and we'll have a few surprises, too."

Ahrens, retired General Motors Vice President from Oakland County, said that he would outline the financial status of the state organization. Ahrens said, "we hope to see many of our contributors at this meeting to see exactly what is being done with their money. We have issued invitations to all contributors in the county", he added.
