What's Happening In Your Township

The eighteen projects mapped for 1958 County primary road program will include the construction of new 22-foot concrete pavement on 12 Mile from Orchard Lake Road to Haggerty Road, also blacktopping on Farmington Road between 10 Mile and 12 Mile Roads. During 1957, three bridges were replaced by large corrugated steel girders. The locations are: 13 Mile between Farmington and Drake Roads; Drake Road at Howard Road; and Howard Road west of Drake. A 74-footer is still to go under Halsted Road, south of 12 Mile. This work was done with matching funds.

The amount of matching funds for 1958 will be considerably more than last year, which will enable the Road Commission to replace several narrow and dangerous bridges still existing in the Township.

During a visit to the Oakland County Road Commission offices last week, the matter of the Township owning a couple of pieces of Road equipment was discussed. All were in agreement that we would certainly get much more maintenance work done by owning some equipment. The cost of operation and maintenance of this equipment would come from our state allocation. The purchase price would come from the Township General Fund and could be financed over a period of two or three years. There are many townships in the state, including Waterford and Redford, with this arrangement. Be sure to attend the Township annual meeting on April 5 and vote for better roads and other things.

Bethel Baptist To Participate In Missionary Conf., Feb. 16 - 23

The Bethel Baptist Church of Farmington will be participating in a Missionary Conference being held in the Greater Detroit area from February 16th through 23rd, it was announced this week. The conference was instituted by the Highland Park Baptist Church, and this year approximately 320 churches of various denominations will participate in this endeavor.

Speakers come from a variety of countries and represent almost every area of the world where missionary work is undertaken.

Sunday morning, February 16th, Dr. Francis Steele of the North Africa Mission, will speak to the Adult Sunday School classes at 9:45 a.m. and at the morning Worship Service at 11:00 a.m. Dr. Steele was active for several seasons in some of the most important excavations in Southern Mesopotamia while working in the field of archaeology.

Rev. Virgil Newbrander will speak at the Sunday Evening Gospel Hour at 7:30 p.m. He comes to us from the Far Eastern Gospel Crusade Mission and has served as Headmaster of the Christian Academy in Tokyo.

Monday evening at 7:30 p.m. Dr. Clarence Jones of the World Radio Mission Fellowship will speak. This work is centered in Ecuador and Panama City, Tuesday evening at 7:30 p.m. Rev. and Mrs. Vern Rock of The Evangelical Alliance Mission, who have been working in Pakistan will speak. Wednesday evening at 7:30 p.m. Rev. Guy Longley of the China Inland Mission will be the guest. The work has been in Hong Kong, Singapore, Malaysia and Indonesia. Thursday evening at 7:30 p.m. Rev. W. E. Davis of the Bible Fellowship Christian Union will speak of his work in Europe and Canada.

Friday evening at 7:30 p.m. Dr. Hugh Farrell of the Christ's Mission, a former Roman Catholic monk of the Carmelite order, will speak of his work with the Protestant Truth Society in North Ireland and England.

Sunday, February 23rd, Dr. Elmer Kilbourne of the Oriental Missions Society will speak at 9:45 and 11:00 a.m. and will speak of his work in Korea. Mr. Kilbourne has been honored with high recognition and is a personal friend of Pres. Syngman Rhee.

A warm invitation is extended to all to attend any of these meetings.

C'ville School Growth Charted

Two subdivisions in the Clarenceville school district have recently been surveyed for their likely effect on classroom needs.

In the Botsford Park subdivision of 200 houses, 37 are under construction or not yet occupied. In the Heartstone sub, where 162 are being built, about 29 are not occupied. At Heartstone another 97 could be built.

Sup't Louis E. Schmidt estimates that by next fall, or the first of the year, 200 more families will have moved into the school district, even if there are no new developments.

This is one of the school growth problems being discussed by school board members at various public meetings.

"Kilowatts at Work," a history of The Detroit Edison Company, has just been published, and a copy goes to the Farmington city-township library.

Written by Raymond C. Miller, professor of history at Wayne State University, the book is an impressive volume that rapidly growing body of research in American business history.

Annual World Vision Conference To Begin Sunday at S'field Comm.

The Tenth Annual World Vision Conference of the Southfield Community Church, 21222 Lincoln Street (near Eight Mile and Inkster), will be conducted nightly from February 16-23, according to Pastor Raymond Bayne.

The programs will feature new reports from speakers recently returned from many foreign fields, color films and slides of missions, and special music. Included will be reports from Japan, South Africa, Nigeria, Pakistan, Guatemala, British Columbia, Vietnam, Puerto Rico, and the Belgian Congo.

The conference will begin with a special emphasis on Christian witnessing by the individual in his daily activities under the leadership of Harry Saulnier, director of the Pacific Garden Mission in Chicago and of the national radio program "Unshackled."

Mr. Saulnier will speak at four services on Sunday and on Monday evening. Week-night meetings will be at 7:30. Sunday meetings will be at 10 and 11:15 a.m. and 6 and 7 p.m. Mrs. William Taylor of Guatemala will speak to the women on Wednesday, February 18th, at 11:00.

Speakers for the first Sunday, February 16th, will include Harry Saulnier at all four services, and in addition to him, Rev. Hollis Peterson of Japan who will speak in the Bible School hour at 10, and Rev. Don Genheimer of S. Africa who will speak and show pictures at the special youth meeting at 6.

The Tuesday night speaker will be Rev. Michael Gilem of Nigeria who will have a film of his work with the special youth meeting on Wednesday night.

Capt. C. F. Slabbert of British Columbia will be the featured speaker on Thursday. A special children's

"Oiltown U.S.A." famed Billy Graham film released by World Wide Pictures, will be shown in Farmington Sunday, February 16. Local arrangements are in charge of the North Farmington Baptist Church, who has secured Bond School for the showing.

Graham amazed the entertainment and religious worlds when he produced the world's first Christian western film, "Mr. Texas." More than 5,000,000 persons saw the film in its first two years of showings, and the Graham organization reported that 155,000 persons made "decisions for Christ" through the ministry of the picture.

"Oiltown U.S.A.," a sequel to "Mr. Texas" was filmed during Graham's crusade in Houston, Texas, and features the young evangelist and his team in their meetings in Rice Stadium, where the audience was as high as 40,000 for a single service. Featured in the 80 minute, full color film, are Colleen Townsend Evans, Paul Power, Robert Clarke, George Lee, Ralph Hoopes, and the stars of "Mr. Texas," Redd Harper and Cindy Walker.

The doors to Bond School will be open at 6:30 p.m. with the picture beginning at 7:00 p.m. All seats will be available on a "first come" basis, with no admission charge.

City Manager Form Growing

Farmington is one of the 1,556 cities and towns in the United States and Canada which have the council-manager plan of government. Some statistics on this were given this week by City Manager Earl Scherffus.

Of the number 104 municipalities decided in 1957 to adopt the plan. More than half of the total adopted the plan during the 10-year period from 1948 through 1957, an annual gain of 78 cities.

California leads with 179 places under the council-manager plan, followed by Maine with 131, Michigan with 126, and Michigan with 119.

The first council-manager charter was adopted by popular vote 46 years ago. Now 47 per cent of all cities in the U.S. over 25,000 have this form of government, and 42 per cent of cities between 10,000 and 25,000.

A total of 339 city manager appointments were made in 1957 by Mr. Scherffus. Of these 194 men entered the profession for the first time, and 67, or about one-third, had been assistants to managers.

A graduate of Eastern Michigan College, Ypsilanti, he will serve in the newly created position of physical education teacher in the elementary schools.
