**Falcons Upset Southfield; Meet Berkley This Friday**

The third place Farmington Falcons will meet the first-place Berkley Bears in an away conference contest tomorrow, February 21 at 7:00 p.m.

The Bears, defeated only in their first game of the season to non-conference Ferndale, hold an eight-win-no-loss record in the league. In the previous Farmington-Berkley game, the Falcons gave the Bears a scare in the second half but lost by a score of only 55-52.

Farmington humiliated Southfield in a conference game last Friday by a score of 65-53, for their third win in a row.

The Falcons, led by top scorer Harvey Chapman with 20 points, gained a substantial lead at the end of the first quarter.

The Jays began to close the margin, but, at the end of the half, the Falcons still led by three points. The score was 31-21.

In the second half, Farmington started to pull further ahead and set the third quarter score at 47-41.

The Falcons remained too great a threat for the Jays, and won the game by 12 points.

Chapman earned 10 of his 20 points in the first quarter alone. Other top scorers in the game from Farmington were: Dave Cather-

man, 13 points, and Al LeSage and Ralph Garry, nine points.

Dave Kruse, Southfield's high point man, made 13 points in 30 minutes.

Fifty of Farmington's 65 points were obtained by Baskets, compared to Southfield's 24 points from their 53 point score.

In the other conference game, Van Dyke led his fifth game in a row to Waterford by a score of 55-52, and Berkley beat Walled Lake, 69-40.

Top man and mainstay for the Bulldogs was big Brian Watson who bucketed 29 points. Watson displayed exceptional versatility as he poured in shots from all angles of the court.

One of the decisive factors of Friday's contest was the high percentage of free throws made by the Trojans. From an attempted 17 free throws, Clarencville tallied 12. Coach Harry Fostick's five seemed unable to score the gratis shots and hit for only 10 of 23 attempts.

Friday, February 21, Clarencville travels to Bloomfield Hills to face the Barons for the second time this year. Game time has been set for 8 p.m.

**Catherman Leading Falcon Scorer**

Top scorer on the Farmington Falcon cage team this season is Dave Catherman, according to statistics released by Athletic Director Jack Cotton last week.

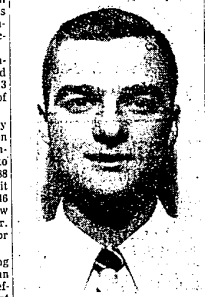
Prior to last Friday's game against Southfield, Catherman had scored a total of 111 points, in 13 games for a per-game average of 8.7 points.

Although not an exceptionally high per-game average, it takes on added significance when the number of attempts made is taken into consideration. Of this total, 89 have come in field goals. He hit 44 times on 94 attempts for a 46 per cent record. In the free-throw department he fared even better. Of 88 attempts he hit 23 times for a 26 per cent record.

Following Catherman in scoring is Al LaSage with 93 points in an equal number of contests. His effectiveness in hitting is somewhat less impressive, however. Taking 146 field goal shots he hit on only 41 for 82 points or a 28 per cent completion record. At the free-throw line he hit six times on 12 attempts for 50 per cent.

Close behind LaSage is Dewey Nichols with 83 points. He hit 24 times on 60 attempted field goals for a 40 per cent record and racked up the remainder on his effectiveness at the gift-toss line. He hit 37 times on 54 attempts for a 69 per cent record.

Others scoring over 50 points on the team thus far this season, ex-

cluding Friday's action, have been Horace Waters with 71 points for a 5.5 per game average and Tom Brown with 58 points for a 4.8 per game average.

In these 13 games, including three contests in the Christmas cage tourney here, Farmington has scored 613 points to their opponents 692. Although not having been outscored badly, however, the Falcons have been able to take only five victories in these 13 contests with two of them coming in the Christmas tournament.
