12,000, many experiencing the impact of very rapid growth along the North Woodward axis. Its downtown, which incidentally has very similar to downtown Farmington, found itself competing with new shopping centers in its trade area.

The city, property owners, and merchants undertook a broad program of parking and street improvements, say Geer Associates. The rapidly growing business potential, matched with basic public works improvements, resulted in privately undertaken clearance and redevelopment, expansion, and modernization, with a major increase in tax base.

From 1947 to 1957, population grew from 12,683 to 24,300. Retail sales grew from \$22,771,000 to \$30,000,000.

Mr. Scheriff reported he had contacted two firms against whom complaints had been lodged for having signs on city property. In view of the ordinance which gave until next year to comply with removal of these obstructions, he is now checking legal angles to see if the city may extend enforcement of this time.


