Tips on Taxes For Pensioners

Taxpayers who will receive back their investment in a pension within three years from the receipt of the first payment do not pay income tax on the payments until all the cost is recovered. After the cost is recovered, the full amount of the pension is taxable.

For those whose cost will not be recovered in three years, another method of determining the taxable portion is used.

The computation is made on Part I of Schedule E. Two facts must be determined in order to compute the amount of the pension payments which are taxable. The first fact to determine is the cost or investment in the pension. Secondly, the expected return, or the amount which you will receive must be determined. That means the amount which will be received over the entire period of the pension. Generally, the expected return is based on life expectancy and actuarial tables must be referred to for this information. The Internal Revenue Service will furnish this information upon request.

With the two previous mentioned facts, Part I of Schedule E of the Form 1040 can easily be completed.
